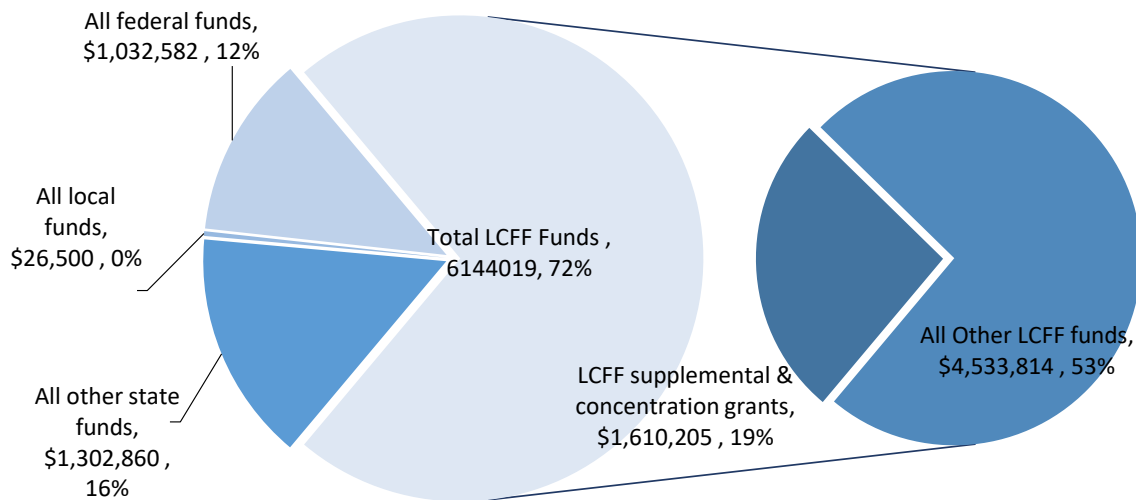

### Projected Revenue by Fund Source

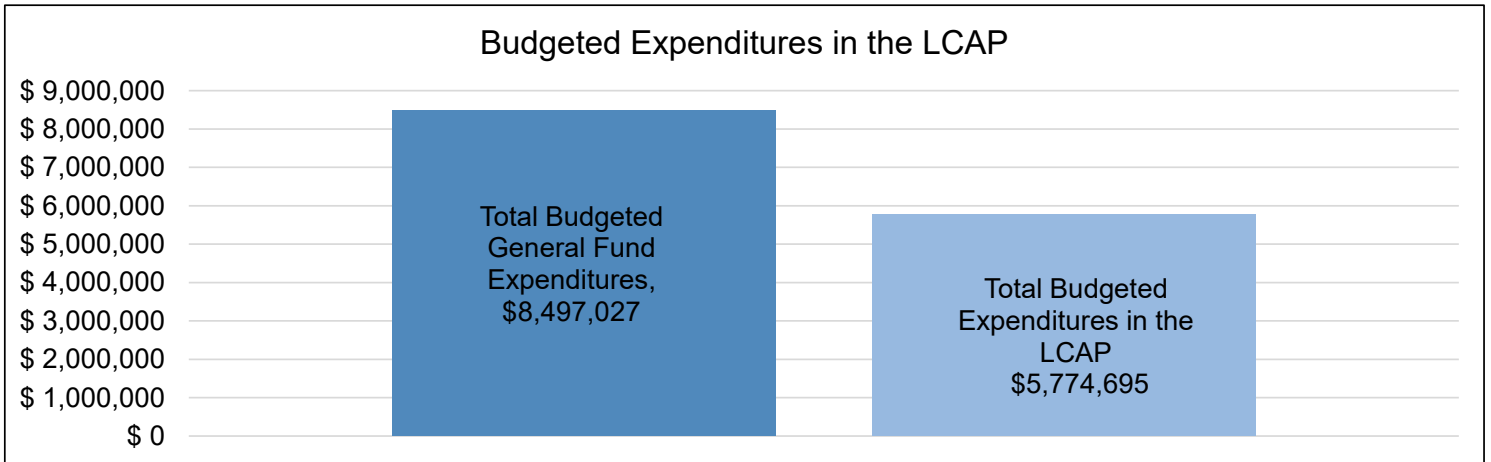


This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Big Picture Educational Academy expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

The text description for the above chart is as follows: The total revenue projected for Big Picture Educational Academy is \$8,505,961.00, of which \$6,144,019.00 is Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), \$1,302,860.00 is other state funds, \$26,500.00 is local funds, and \$1,032,582.00 is federal funds. Of the \$6,144,019.00 in LCFF Funds, \$1,610,205.00 is generated based on the enrollment of high needs students (foster youth, English learner, and low-income students).

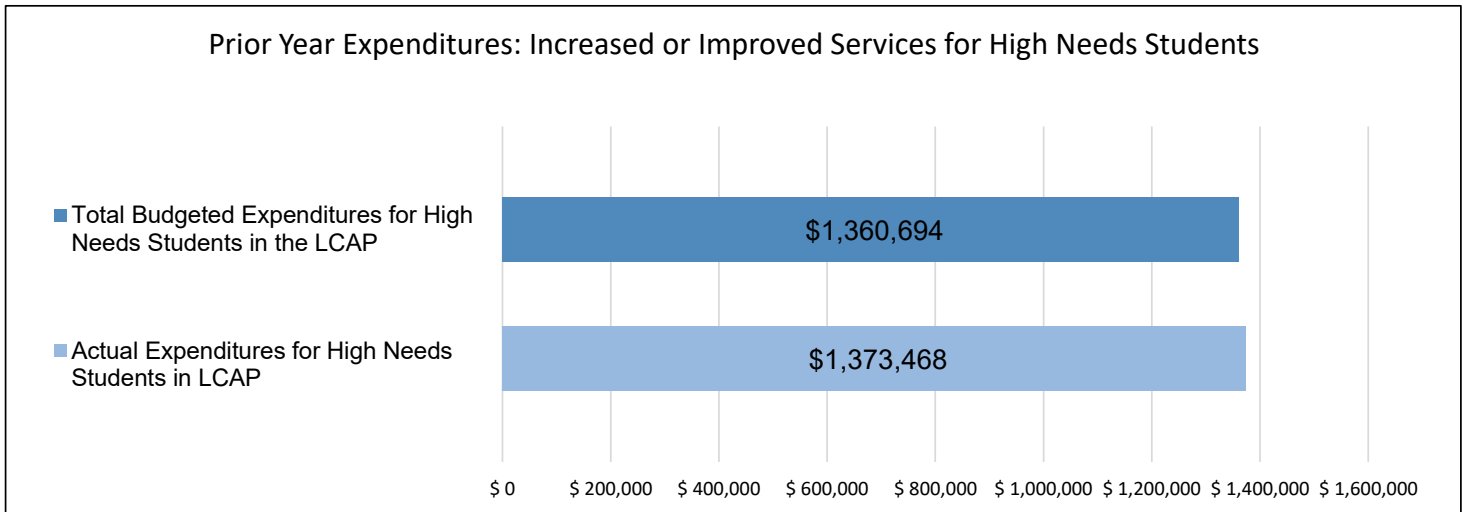

## Plan Summary 2026-27

### General Information

A description of the LEA, its schools, and its students in grades transitional kindergarten–12, as applicable to the LEA.

Big Picture Educational Academy (BPEA) is a unique college/career preparatory charter that includes an elementary school, a middle school, a high school, and an adult center for training and careers. As part of its program, BPEA supports many adult-aged high school students to complete high school. BPEA believes in following the principles of the “new three R’s,” Rigor, Relevance, and Relationships. BPEA believes that successful schools combine rigor, high expectations and a meaningful course of study; relevance – making instruction relevant to students’ experiences, cultures, and long-term goals; and relationships, powerful, sustained involvement with caring staff and older students who mentor, advise, and support students throughout their school careers. BPEA is identified as an alternative school under the Dashboard Alternative School Status (DASS) program.

In 2025–26, BPEA served 419 students with diverse needs and backgrounds. Approximately 73.5% of students identify as Hispanic or Latino, 15.0% as African American, and 6.2% as White. Additionally, approximately 80.2% of students are Socioeconomically Disadvantaged, while 7.2% are English Learners. Homeless youth make up 11.7% of the school population. In addition, approximately 11.5% of students qualify for special education services.

The purpose of this Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) is to address the School Plan for Student Achievement (SPSA) for Big Picture Educational Academy which is the Schoolwide Program; herein referred to as the LCAP. The Charter School’s plan is to effectively meet the ESSA Requirements in alignment with the LCAP and other federal, state and local programs. The plans included in the LCAP address these requirements, compliant to include focusing on three goals: 1) BPEA students will meet or exceed academic standards and achieve their academic goals while maintaining their sense of identity. 2) BPEA students and staff will feel supported, recognized, and connected to the BPEA school community; 3) BPEA students will be more aware of their strengths, interests, and feel a sense of ownership and membership within the community. The Charter School completed a comprehensive needs assessment of the entire school which included an analysis of verifiable state data and local performance data used to measure student outcomes as evidenced in the annual update portion of the LCAP. The needs assessment process included meeting parents, classified staff, teachers and administrators to identify areas of opportunity for the students and groups of students who are not achieving standard mastery and to identify strategies which will be implemented in the LCAP to address those areas of opportunity.

The identification of the process for evaluating and monitoring the implementation of the LCAP and the progress toward accomplishing the established goals will include discussing the actions and services with the use of supplemental funds at the school level through the Parent

Advisory Council and Parent Teacher Club which will include parents of English Learners. The Parent Advisory Council will meet four times per year to inform the process. Parents, classified staff, certificated staff and an administrator will make up the council. The number of parents will exceed or be equal to the number of total staff members. The council will discuss academic performance, supplemental services and areas to make improvements with Title funds as part of the School Plan included in the LCAP conversations at the meeting in the fall and at the meeting in the spring. The teachers, staff, students and parents also participate in an annual survey which provides feedback on the goals and services. The teachers, staff and administrators actively participate in the decision-making process throughout the year and during LCAP workshops. The decisions will take into account the needs of Big Picture Educational Academy based on student achievement data to include SBAC, ELPAC, and interim assessment data such as NWEA MAP, cumulative assessments, and attendance and student demographic data to include the significant subgroups of Latino, Black or African American, White, socioeconomically disadvantaged, students with disabilities, and English Learners. This student achievement data and student demographic data will be used as a basis for making decisions about the use of supplemental federal funds and the development of policies on basic core services.

Each goal includes actions and services that address the needs of all students and significant subgroups which include evidence-based strategies that provide opportunities for all children, methods and instructional strategies, and particular focus on students at risk of not meeting the State academic standards.

This LEA does not receive Equity Multiplier Funding.

## Reflections: Annual Performance

A reflection on annual performance based on a review of the California School Dashboard (Dashboard) and local data.

### 2025 Dashboard Reflection

As a Dashboard Alternative School Status (DASS) school serving a high-risk student population, BPEA continues to demonstrate progress across several key California Dashboard indicators while maintaining a focus on areas requiring continued improvement. The 2025 Dashboard reflects positive gains in Mathematics, English Learner Progress, Chronic Absenteeism, and Suspension Rates, indicating that targeted academic, attendance, and social-emotional supports are contributing to improved student outcomes. At the same time, English Language Arts, Graduation Rate, and College/Career Readiness remain areas of need and will continue to be priorities within the 2026-27 LCAP.

### Successes

**Mathematics:** BPEA increased by 18.9 points in Mathematics, moving into the Orange performance category on the California Dashboard. The school will build on this success through the continued implementation of Action 1.8, Response to Intervention–Coordination and Curriculum.

**English Language Arts:** While overall ELA performance remains below standard, Students with Disabilities demonstrated significant improvement, increasing 29.1 points from the prior year. This growth reflects the positive impact of targeted academic interventions, individualized supports, and the implementation of Action 1.8, Response to Intervention–Coordination and Curriculum. The progress of this student group represents an important success and demonstrates that the school's instructional supports are helping accelerate learning for students with the greatest academic needs.

**English Learner Progress Indicator:** BPEA increased by +20.7 points on the English Learner Progress Indicator, demonstrating significant growth in English language proficiency. While the English Learner student group remains too small to receive a performance color on the California Dashboard, the school will build on this positive trend through the implementation of Action 1.4, English Learner Supports.

**Chronic Absenteeism:** BPEA's targeted attendance initiatives resulted in meaningful improvements in chronic absenteeism across several student groups. Most notably, chronic absenteeism among Students with Disabilities declined by 20.9%. Additional gains were seen among and Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students (1%). Overall, chronic absenteeism declined by 2.3%, reflecting the impact of focused attendance supports and student services. BPEA will continue to build on this progress through the implementation of Actions 2.5, Attendance Initiatives, and 1.3, Comprehensive Student Services.

**Suspension Rate:** BPEA demonstrated positive results in reducing suspension rates across multiple student groups. Most notably, the English Learner group decreased its suspension rate by 0.9%, moving into the Green performance category on the California Dashboard. Additional improvements were seen among Students with Disabilities (-1.3%), African American students (-1.5%), Hispanic students (-0.7%), and Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students (-0.5%). These results reflect the impact of the school's efforts to promote positive student behavior, engagement, and support services. BPEA will continue to build on this success through the implementation of Action 2.3, SEL and Mental Health.

## Needs

**English Language Arts:** English Language Arts remains an area of need, with BPEA performing in the Red performance category at 101.2 points below standard. Although overall performance improved slightly by 1.3 points, achievement levels remain well below state standards for many students. BPEA will continue implementing Action 1.8, Response to Intervention–Coordination and Curriculum, to strengthen literacy instruction, address persistent achievement gaps, and accelerate progress toward grade-level proficiency for all students.

**Graduation Rate:** Graduation Rate remains an area of need for BPEA, with the school performing in the Red performance category (31.3%). Hispanic students (41.0%) and Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students (35.9%) also performed in the Red category. To improve graduation outcomes, BPEA will continue implementing Action 2.5, Attendance Initiatives, and Action 1.12, College Counseling.

**College/Career Indicator:** College and career readiness remains an area of need for BPEA. While the school demonstrated modest improvement, increasing by 1.1 percentage points to 2.2% prepared, overall readiness levels remain low. The 2025 Dashboard indicates that additional efforts are needed to ensure students graduate prepared for postsecondary education and career opportunities. To address this need, BPEA will continue implementing Action 1.12, College Counseling, and Action 1.8, Response to Intervention–Coordination and Curriculum.

**Chronic Absenteeism:** Although chronic absenteeism improved overall by 2.3% and Students with Disabilities demonstrated a substantial improvement of 20.9%, chronic absenteeism remains an area of focus, particularly for Students with Disabilities (38.3%). BPEA will continue implementing Action 2.5, Attendance Initiatives, and Action 1.3, Comprehensive Student Services.

**Suspension Rate:** While BPEA's overall Suspension Rate improved by 0.9%, moving from the Orange to the Green performance category, suspension outcomes remain an area of focus for specific student groups. Hispanic students (4.1%) and Students with Disabilities (7.9%) continue to experience disproportionately high suspension rates. To address these disparities, BPEA will continue implementing Action 2.3, SEL and Mental Health.

## 2023 Dashboard Lowest Performing Indicators

Based on the 2023 Dashboard, BPEA has identified a need in Graduation rate overall (Red, 55.7%) and for the Hispanic (Red, 63.8%) and

Socioeconomically Disadvantaged student groups (Red, 59%). To address this need, BPEA will implement Required Action 2.5 Attendance Initiatives as well as 1.12 College Counseling.

BPEA has identified a need in College Career Indicator Overall (Very Low, 0%) and for the Hispanic and Socioeconomically Disadvantaged student groups (both Very Low, 0%). To address this need, BPEA will implement Required Action 2.5 Attendance Initiatives as well as 1.8 Response to Intervention--Coordination and Curriculum.

BPEA has identified a need in Suspension rate for the Students with Disabilities student group (Red, 8.1%). To address this need, BPEA will implement Required Action 1.3 Comprehensive Student Services.

### **Additional Dashboard Data: Informational Purposes**

**Science:** Science results demonstrated encouraging progress across multiple student groups. All Students scored 39.2 points above standard, Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students-maintained performance at 38.1 points above standard, and Hispanic students improved by 2.1 points from the prior year. While science achievement remains an area for continued growth, these results suggest that the school's instructional strategies and academic supports are helping students make progress toward meeting state standards. BPEA will continue refining science instruction and leveraging successful practices to support achievement across all student groups.

**CA Growth Model ELA:** Although English Language Arts remained in the Red performance category at 101.2 points below standard, Growth Model results showed that 67.4% of students improved their performance from the prior year. Moderate growth was also demonstrated among Hispanic students (68.0%), Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students (66.7%), and Students with Disabilities (65.2%). Additionally, Students with Disabilities increased 29.1 points on the California Dashboard, indicating progress among a key student group.

**CA Growth Model Math:** Mathematics demonstrated stronger performance, with 77.5% of students improving their performance from the prior year. Growth was particularly strong among Students with Disabilities (87.0%) and Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students (79.5%), while Hispanic students demonstrated moderate growth at 74.7%. These results align with the school's 18.9-point increase on the California Dashboard and movement into the Orange performance category.

**Reflection:** In reviewing the 2025 Dashboard and local data, BPEA recognizes both areas of growth and areas requiring continued attention. Educational partner feedback collected during the 2025-26 school year reinforced the value of the school's individualized support model, strong student-adult relationships, and commitment to serving high-risk youth. This feedback aligns with improvements seen in Mathematics, English Learner Progress, Chronic Absenteeism, and Suspension Rates. Educational partners also emphasized the importance of continuing efforts to improve Graduation Rate, College and Career Readiness, and English Language Arts achievement.

Local assessment and Growth Model data provide additional evidence that students are making academic progress, particularly in Mathematics and among key student groups, including Students with Disabilities and Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students. While English Language Arts, Graduation Rate, and College and Career Readiness remain areas of need on the California Dashboard, these results suggest that the school's instructional strategies, targeted interventions, and support systems are helping students make meaningful gains. BPEA will continue refining and strengthening these efforts to accelerate achievement and improve long-term student outcomes.

### **Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant (LREBG)**

BPEA has \$37,810 of unexpended Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant (LREBG) funds that will be used during the 2026–2027 school year to support Goal 1, Action 1.2: Curricular Resources. These funds will be used to purchase high-quality, standards-aligned instructional materials to accelerate learning and address unfinished learning. This action aligns with the allowable uses of funds identified in

EC Section 32526(c)(2) by providing learning recovery materials designed to accelerate pupil academic proficiency and English language proficiency, as applicable.

This action was selected because BPEA's needs assessment identified the continued need to strengthen academic achievement through access to high-quality instructional materials that support standards-based instruction, targeted intervention, and learning acceleration for students with unfinished learning. Research demonstrates that access to high-quality, standards-aligned instructional materials improves instructional effectiveness and student achievement.

The effectiveness of this action will be monitored through Goal 1, Metric 1.1: CAASPP English Language Arts Performance and Goal 1, Metric 1.2: CAASPP Mathematics Performance, which measure student academic achievement and progress toward meeting state standards.

## Reflections: Technical Assistance

As applicable, a summary of the work underway as part of technical assistance.

Big Picture Educational Academy has been identified for Differentiated Assistance based on data reported in the 2024 and 2025 California Dashboards.

Based on the 2024 California Dashboard, the school met the criteria for Differentiated Assistance through the performance of the Hispanic, Socioeconomically Disadvantaged, and Students with Disabilities student groups. Hispanic students met the criteria through Red performance levels in English Language Arts, Mathematics, Graduation Rate and/or Chronic Absenteeism, Suspension Rate, and the College/Career Indicator. Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students met the criteria through Red performance levels in English Language Arts, Mathematics, and Graduation Rate and/or Chronic Absenteeism. Students with Disabilities met the criteria through Red performance levels in Graduation Rate and/or Chronic Absenteeism and Suspension Rate.

Based on the 2025 California Dashboard, the school continued to meet the criteria for Differentiated Assistance through the performance of the Hispanic and Socioeconomically Disadvantaged student groups. Both student groups met the criteria through Red performance levels in English Language Arts and Mathematics, Graduation Rate and/or Chronic Absenteeism, and the College/Career Indicator.

During the 2025-26 school year, BPEA continued to work collaboratively with Kern County Superintendent of Schools through the Differentiated Assistance process. In March 2026, school leaders participated in a comprehensive data analysis and needs assessment process that included reviewing Dashboard indicators, analyzing subgroup performance, identifying strengths and areas of opportunity, and conducting a root cause analysis. Particular attention was given to English Language Arts, Mathematics, Graduation Rate, Chronic Absenteeism, College and Career Readiness, and English Learner outcomes.

Through this process, BPEA identified English Language Arts as its primary Problem of Practice due to persistent Red-level performance among the All Student group and key student groups, including Hispanic and Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students. Root cause analysis identified variability in instructional rigor and grade-level expectations, inconsistent implementation of data-informed instructional cycles, and inconsistent structures for meaningful parent engagement as key factors contributing to performance outcomes.

The Differentiated Assistance process also identified several strengths, including strong staff commitment to continuous improvement, effective use of Formative Interim Assessment Blocks (FIABs) to inform instruction, emerging academic progress at Big Picture High School, and increased emphasis on assessment readiness strategies. Based on these findings, BPEA refined action plans aligned to its LCAP goals

and identified opportunities to expand the use of FIABs, strengthen the use of CERS data, increase implementation of designated supports, and replicate successful instructional systems across programs.

This work directly informed implementation of Actions 1.3 Comprehensive Student Services, 1.4 English Learner Supports, 1.8 RTI–Coordination and Curriculum, 1.12 College Counseling, 2.3 Positive School Culture, and 2.5 Attendance and Engagement. BPEA will continue partnering with Kern County staff to identify evidence-based practices, align improvement efforts to Implementation Science principles, monitor implementation effectiveness, and improve outcomes for student groups contributing to the school's Differentiated Assistance identification.

Big Picture Educational Academy (BPEA), a single school LEA, has collaborated with County Office of Education staff to review performance data on the state and local indicators included in the California School Dashboard and the Community Schools Assets & Needs assessment. To develop the CSI plan, staff focused on student attendance rates, chronic absence rates, and graduation rates. Because BPEA has been designated Dashboard Alternative School Status (DASS)—an accountability school type for schools serving high-risk students—the DASS One-Year Graduation Rate was reviewed in addition to the traditional 4-Year and 5-Year Cohort Graduation Rates. Using this data, they conducted a Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats (SWOT) analysis as part of the Big Picture Strategic Plan. This analysis identified strengths and weaknesses aligned with the LCFF (Local Control Funding Formula) state priorities, with particular attention paid to Priority 5 - Pupil Engagement.

To help staff identify and select evidence-based interventions, BPEA provided a clear definition of what constitutes an evidence-based intervention, including the tiers of evidence (Tier 1-3). The team then reviewed these interventions on the What Works Clearinghouse website. Administrators and counselors also attended the MTSS (Multi-Tiered System of Supports) summit hosted by the Fresno County Superintendent of Schools. Interventions were chosen based on their proven effectiveness in improving graduation rates within a similar student population. They were also selected to align with practices the school was already implementing or planned to implement, ensuring a clear trajectory for staff members.

To identify resource inequities, BPEA supported school staff by providing site leaders with all relevant student outcome data, disaggregated by student subgroups and grade levels. This data helped them pinpoint disproportionality in outcomes and potential areas of inequity. BPEA also assisted school staff in analyzing course access and staffing/resource allocation including attendance support, high school counseling, and additional academic support to further identify resource inequities that impact student progress toward graduation. As a result of this

analysis, the school concluded that there are not any resource inequities. 81% of the school population is socioeconomically disadvantaged and all resources are allocated towards supporting all students.

## Monitoring and Evaluating Effectiveness

### CSI Plan: Monitoring and Evaluation

The implementation of the CSI (Comprehensive Support and Improvement) plan will be monitored by school leaders to ensure all staff members are implementing it with fidelity. School leaders will conduct at least monthly observations of core classroom instruction. To evaluate this implementation, school leaders and coaches will use observation tools like the FCSS Coaches Implementation Report on a monthly basis.

### Data-Driven Effectiveness

The CSI plan's effectiveness will be monitored using multiple data sources: NWEA MAP data, teacher assessment data, and attendance data. The BPEA team met regularly with data experts over the 2024-25 school year to review and strengthen systems for tracking and reporting the data to help ensure accuracy.

- NWEA MAP assessments are administered three times each year. School staff and teachers analyze the disaggregated data to determine the most effective school-wide and classroom-based interventions.
- Teacher assessments are administered on an ongoing basis, but at least monthly, and teachers and staff use that assessment data to monitor the effectiveness of classroom-based interventions.
- Attendance data is tracked by school staff members monthly to determine the effectiveness of attendance supports.

### Lagging Indicators and Proactive Interventions

Graduation rates are considered lagging indicators, as they don't provide data soon enough for timely intervention. Since BPEA data analysis shows that low attendance and high chronic absence rates negatively impact student progress toward graduation, attendance data is tracked monthly to enable appropriate interventions in advance.

### Determining Plan Effectiveness

The plan's effectiveness will be determined based on increased daily student attendance, reduced chronic absenteeism, and academic growth. Because BPEA has been designated Dashboard Alternative School Status (DASS)—an accountability school type for schools serving high-risk students—the DASS One-Year Graduation Rate will be used in addition to the traditional 4-Year and 5-Year Cohort Graduation Rates to fully assess the plan's degree of effectiveness.

#### A description of how the adopted LCAP was influenced by the feedback provided by educational partners.

BPEA is committed to engaging students, families, staff, and community members in meaningful dialogue regarding school programs, priorities, and improvement efforts. Feedback is gathered through a variety of forums, including Town Hall meetings, Board meetings, Parent Advisory Committee (PAC) meetings, Parent Teacher Committee (PTC) meetings, surveys, and other opportunities for participation.

The draft 2026–2027 LCAP was presented to the Parent Advisory Committee (PAC)/Parent Teacher Club (PTC) for review and input as part of the LCAP development process. No formal questions or recommendations requiring a written response were received. Feedback gathered throughout the educational partner engagement process informed the development of the adopted LCAP as described below.

Goal 1: Educational partners continued to emphasize the importance of rigorous academics combined with individualized support. Staff identified the need to strengthen instructional practices through ongoing professional development, intervention supports, and the effective use of assessment data. Students expressed appreciation for small class sizes and access to individualized academic help while also requesting additional academic opportunities and support to achieve their postsecondary goals. Feedback reinforced the continuation of Goal 1 actions focused on high-quality instruction, standards-aligned curriculum, English Learner services, intervention supports, assessment systems, and professional learning. Educational partners affirmed that individualized support remains a defining strength of the BPEA instructional model.

Goal 2: Educational partners highlighted the importance of maintaining strong relationships and a positive school climate. Survey results indicated improvements in student safety and connectedness across many grade levels, with students frequently identifying supportive staff relationships, small learning environments, and peer connections as important contributors to their success. Students also expressed a desire for respectful treatment, access to academic and social-emotional support, improved facilities, and additional opportunities for engagement and recognition. Families and staff emphasized the importance of clear communication, attendance supports, student well-being, and continued efforts to strengthen school culture. This feedback supported the continuation of Goal 2 actions related to attendance, PBIS, social-emotional learning, family engagement, school safety, facilities, and student support services.

Goal 3: Educational partners strongly supported the continuation and expansion of real-world learning opportunities that help students identify their strengths, interests, and future pathways. Students, families, and staff emphasized the value of internships, mentorships, field trips, community partnerships, and college and career exploration experiences. Educational partners expressed a desire for expanded opportunities that connect classroom learning to future careers and postsecondary options. This feedback directly informed the continuation of Goal 3 actions related to Learning Through Internships, Leave to Learn activities, college and career readiness, community partnerships, and student recruitment. Educational partners affirmed that authentic, real-world learning experiences remain central to the BPEA educational model and student success.

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

BPEA developed this goal in order to encompass and articulate the vision, actions, targets, and associated expenditures in support of student learning of both foundational academic skills and real-world skills both for the TK-12 and the high-school aged adult program. The Big Picture vision incorporates authentic learning experiences in conjunction with highly effective instruction. The 2024 Dashboard shows Math at red level (-166) and ELA also at red level (-102.5). The 2024 English Learner Progress Indicator was 39.3%. Academic growth and achievement are a very high priority. The leadership team, in consultation with stakeholders, decided to create an LCAP goal to encompass all the programmatic and budgetary components mobilized toward the achievement of our academic outcomes. BPEA students need a strong foundation in academic and real-world skills in order to be successful in college and career. We believe that the components of this goal will generate the momentum needed to meet the targets. We plan to measure the effectiveness of action 1.1 through teacher credentialing. We will measure actions 1.3,1.6, 1.7, 1.8, 1.9 and 1.10 with metrics for CAASPP, EAP, NWEA, CAST, IEP Success rate, Standards implementation, guided reading implementation, Adult GPA, and PFT participation. Action 1.2 Curricular Resources will be measured by student access to materials. Action 1.4 will be measured through Adult ESL, Phonics assessment, ELPI, and EL Reclassification metrics. Action 1.5 will be measured by % of Long Term English Learners scoring on ELPAC at levels 3 and 4. Action 1.12

# Goal Analysis for 2025-26

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

During the 2025-26 school year, BPEA implemented the actions associated with Goal 1 to support academic achievement, standards-based instruction, intervention services, English Learner progress, college readiness, and access to a broad course of study. Implementation was largely consistent with the actions and services described in the LCAP and included standards-aligned curriculum, comprehensive student supports, response-to-intervention services, English Learner supports, college counseling, and ongoing professional development for staff.

## Successes

Action 1.1 Well-Qualified Teachers: BPEA continued to recruit, retain, and support highly qualified staff through mentoring, coaching, induction support, and ongoing professional development. Teachers demonstrated a strong commitment to student learning and utilized a variety of instructional strategies to engage students and meet diverse learning needs across all programs.

Actions 1.2 Curricular Resources and 1.9 Coaching and Professional Development: Teachers implemented standards-aligned curriculum and participated in curriculum mapping, planning, and professional learning to improve instructional consistency across programs. Educational partners reported that students had access to a common curriculum and engaging instructional practices, including interactive activities and hands-on learning experiences. Through an extensive partnership with Fresno County Superintendent of Schools (FCSS), all instructional staff participated in coaching, professional learning communities, or individualized support designed to strengthen instructional practice and student outcomes.

Actions 1.6 High-Quality Assessments and 1.8 Response to Intervention: Staff utilized NWEA, CAASPP, classroom assessments, and structured data cycles to identify student needs, provide reteaching opportunities, and implement targeted interventions. Students were encouraged to set academic goals and monitor their own progress, helping foster a culture of continuous improvement. Detailed assessment and intervention calendars supported consistent implementation across programs. In addition, collaboration with FCSS coaches and Kern County Differentiated Assistance partners supported the development of an implementation team focused on expanding the use of FIABs, IABs, and other state interim assessment tools to strengthen instructional planning and student achievement.

Actions 1.3 Comprehensive Student Services and 1.7 Response to Intervention–Aides: Students benefited from individualized support services, small class sizes, and intervention programs designed to address academic, behavioral, and social-emotional needs. Educational partners reported that these supports helped students build confidence, maintain a strong sense of identity, and persist through academic challenges. These supports continue to be a defining strength of the BPEA educational model.

Actions 1.4 English Learner Supports and 1.5 Long-Term English Learner Supports: The school continued implementing designated and integrated English Language Development supports while closely monitoring English Learner progress throughout the year. As part of BPEA's work with Kern County through the Differentiated Assistance process and ongoing FCSS coaching support, the school increased its focus on English Learner achievement. The Director of Curriculum and Instruction worked directly with teachers through classroom observations, coaching, and professional learning to strengthen implementation of effective English Learner strategies across all programs.

## Challenges

Action 1.2 Curricular Resources: The implementation of newly adopted curriculum materials did not occur as originally planned due to challenges with platform integration, data syncing, and training provided by the vendor. These issues required staff to adjust instructional pacing and implementation timelines throughout the school year. While these challenges primarily impacted BPE and BPHS, staff worked collaboratively to minimize disruptions and maintain access to standards-aligned instruction.

Actions 1.1 Well-Qualified Teachers and 1.2 Curricular Resources: BPHS experienced ongoing staffing challenges in science, resulting in inconsistent science instruction and the use of online coursework for some students. Recruiting and retaining qualified single-subject science teachers continues to be challenging both locally and statewide. BPEA will continue prioritizing recruitment efforts and instructional support to strengthen science programming and ensure students have access to high-quality instruction across all grade levels.

Actions 1.3 Comprehensive Student Services, 1.7 Response to Intervention–Aides, and 1.8 Response to Intervention: While comprehensive supports were available across BPEA, BPHS experienced challenges related to timely access to mental health services due to limited clinician availability through a contracted provider. This reduced access to support for some students during portions of the school year. In response, BPEA expanded mental health support services for the 2026-27 school year to better meet student needs.

Actions 1.6 High-Quality Assessments, 1.7 Response to Intervention, and 1.11 Extended Learning Opportunities: Chronic absenteeism continued to impact implementation of several Goal 1 actions by limiting student access to instruction, interventions, and extended learning opportunities. While BPE's Expanded Learning Opportunities Program remained highly successful and well integrated with the instructional day, participation in before- and after-school programming was lower than desired at BPHS. BPEA will continue exploring strategies to increase student participation and engagement in extended learning opportunities.

Action 1.8 Response to Intervention–Coordination and Curriculum: Some teachers were responsible for delivering instruction across multiple course levels, particularly in mathematics, creating challenges in differentiating instruction and providing targeted intervention support. Despite these challenges, staff successfully integrated intervention schedules and classroom-based supports throughout the year. The school will continue refining intervention systems and exploring ways to expand dedicated intervention staffing.

#### An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

Several Goal 1 actions experienced material variances between budgeted and estimated actual expenditures during the 2025-26 school year. These variances were primarily the result of changes in staffing allocations, increased student support service costs, expanded professional development and intervention services, and actual program implementation needs. BPEA did not receive or incorporate Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant (LREBG) funds into the 2025-26 LCAP. There were no material differences between the planned and estimated actual percentages of Improved Services.

Action 1.3 Comprehensive Student Services: Budgeted expenditures of \$75,000 increased to estimated actual expenditures of \$290,909. The increase was primarily due to higher-than-anticipated costs for specialized student support services, including psychological services, speech and language pathology services, occupational therapy services, and expanded supports for students with disabilities.

Action 1.4 English Learner Supports: Budgeted expenditures of \$81,531 increased to estimated actual expenditures of \$96,431. The increase was due to additional staffing and professional development costs incurred to support English Learner services and implementation of English Language Development programs.

Action 1.6 High-Quality Assessments: Budgeted expenditures of \$136,531 increased to estimated actual expenditures of \$211,813. The increase was due to additional staffing, assessment administration, data analysis support, and contracted assessment services used to strengthen the school's assessment program.

Action 1.7 Response to Intervention–Aides: Budgeted expenditures of \$494,000 decreased to estimated actual expenditures of \$312,500. The decrease was primarily due to staffing vacancies and lower-than-anticipated costs associated with intervention aide positions.

Action 1.8 Response to Intervention–Coordination and Curriculum: Budgeted expenditures of \$139,588 increased to estimated actual expenditures of \$187,199. The increase was due to additional staffing and coordination costs associated with intervention services, curriculum implementation, and academic support programs.

Action 1.9 Coaching and Professional Development–Foundational: Budgeted expenditures of \$176,063 increased to estimated actual expenditures of \$213,984. The increase was due to additional professional development, coaching, and staff training opportunities provided during the school year.

Action 1.10 Coaching and Professional Development–Targeted Support: Budgeted expenditures of \$31,531 increased to estimated actual expenditures of \$109,406. The increase was due to expanded staffing and professional development costs associated with targeted support for English Learners and other student groups requiring additional academic intervention and support.

Action 1.11 Extended Learning Opportunities: Budgeted expenditures of \$270,000 increased to estimated actual expenditures of \$378,650. The increase was due to higher-than-anticipated costs for summer programming, before-school and after-school programs, and other extended learning opportunities provided to students.

Action 1.12 College Counseling: Budgeted expenditures of \$54,519 decreased to estimated actual expenditures of \$31,250. The decrease was due to lower-than-anticipated staffing and operational costs associated with college counseling services during the school year.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

### Effective Actions

Actions 1.1 Well-Qualified Teachers, 1.2 Curricular Resources, 1.6 High-Quality Assessments, 1.8 Response to Intervention–Coordination and Curriculum, 1.9 Coaching and Professional Development–Foundational, and 1.10 Coaching and Professional Development–Targeted Support: These actions were effective in supporting academic achievement and instructional improvement. Teachers implemented standards-aligned curriculum, participated in curriculum mapping and professional development, and utilized assessment data to inform instruction and intervention. Ongoing coaching and support provided through Fresno County Superintendent of Schools and Kern County Differentiated Assistance further strengthened instructional practices, assessment systems, and intervention planning. Evidence of effectiveness includes an 18.9-point increase in Mathematics performance, a 1.3-point increase in English Language Arts performance overall, and a 29.1-point increase in English Language Arts performance for Students with Disabilities. Additionally, 46% of TK-8 students and 55% of high school students met annual NWEA Reading growth targets, while 40% of TK-8 students and 57% of high school students met annual NWEA Mathematics growth targets. These results indicate that instructional coaching, curriculum implementation, assessment practices, and intervention supports contributed to improved student outcomes.

Actions 1.3 Comprehensive Student Services, 1.7 Response to Intervention–Aides, and 1.11 Extended Learning Opportunities: These actions were effective in increasing student access to academic, behavioral, and social-emotional supports across BPEA, although access to some mental health services was more limited at BPHS during portions of the school year.. Students benefited from individualized

interventions, small-group support, and extended learning opportunities. Evidence of effectiveness includes a 2.3% decline in chronic absenteeism overall and a 20.9% decline among Students with Disabilities. Suspension rates also improved across several student groups, including Students with Disabilities, African American students, Hispanic students, and Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students. These outcomes suggest that comprehensive support systems and intervention services positively impacted student engagement and access to learning.

Actions 1.4 English Learner Supports and 1.5 Long-Term English Learner Supports: These actions were effective in supporting English language acquisition and student progress toward proficiency. The English Learner Progress Indicator increased by 20.7 points, with 60% of English Learners making progress toward English proficiency. English Learners also demonstrated significant improvement in English Language Arts performance. These outcomes suggest that designated and integrated ELD instruction, progress monitoring, targeted supports, and increased instructional coaching focused on English Learner strategies are contributing to improved outcomes for English Learners.

### **Somewhat Effective Actions**

Action 1.12 College Counseling: These actions were somewhat effective in supporting college and career readiness. While the College/Career Indicator improved from 1.1% to 2.2% prepared, overall readiness levels remain low. A-G completion, CTE pathway completion, dual enrollment participation, and postsecondary enrollment continue to be areas requiring additional growth. During the year, BPEA continued individualized academic and career counseling, credit reviews, and postsecondary planning activities. The school will continue refining and expanding college and career readiness supports to improve student outcomes in these areas.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

No substantive changes were made to Goal 1, its metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the 2026-27 school year. Based on implementation and outcome data, the LEA determined that the existing actions remain aligned to student needs and will continue implementation while monitoring effectiveness through ongoing data review and educational partner feedback.

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

We aim to create a positive school culture where families and students are engaged ensures that students attend school regularly, engage in positive behavior, and remain enrolled to graduate and matriculate into a college or career program of their choosing. The 2024 CA Dashboard shows chronic absenteeism at yellow level (53%). Suspension rate on the 2024 Dashboard was at orange level overall (4.7%). Graduation rate 2024 was 32.8%. In this goal, we have created a set of actions and associated expenditures aligned to the desired outcomes for 2027. They are designed to create conditions for our students and families to engage and be empowered to achieve academic success. We will measure the effectiveness of actions 2.1 and 2.2 by family input and participation metrics. We will measure the effectiveness of actions 2.4, and 2.6 through suspension and expulsion rate metrics. We will measure the effectiveness of actions 2.5 and 2.7 through ADA, chronic absenteeism, dropout rates, graduation rates, and graduate outcomes metrics. We will measure the effectiveness of actions 2.3, 2.8, 2.9, and 2.10 through climate survey and facilities inspection metrics.

## Goal Analysis for 2025-26

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

The actions outlined in Goal 2 supported progress toward the goal that BPEA students and staff will feel supported, recognized, and connected to the BPEA school community. As of the 2025-26 school year, all ten actions associated with Goal 2 were actively implemented. These actions focused on parent engagement, communication and translation services, social-emotional learning and mental health supports, student activities, attendance initiatives, Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS), student and family support services, health and safety, facilities improvements, and organizational development.

Educational partner feedback gathered through surveys, meetings, and ongoing engagement activities indicated that students, families, and staff highly value supportive relationships, individualized assistance, clear communication, and opportunities for meaningful connection to the school community. Because BPEA serves students across elementary, middle school, high school, and adult education programs, survey results and outcome data reflected differing developmental needs and experiences across grade spans. While many students identified teachers, counselors, and positive peer relationships as important sources of support and connection, educational partners also identified opportunities to strengthen student engagement, behavioral systems, family participation, and access to enrichment opportunities. As a result, the implementation outcomes described below should be considered within the context of BPEA's diverse student population and educational settings.

### Successes

Actions 2.1 Parent Engagement and 2.2 Parent Engagement–Targeted Supports: BPEA continued providing opportunities for family engagement through parent-teacher conferences, school events, and ongoing communication with families. Educational partners reported positive relationships with teachers and staff, and many parents indicated that regular communication, academic updates, and responsive support helped them remain informed and engaged in their child's educational experience.

Actions 2.3 SEL and Mental Health, 2.6 Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS), and 2.7 Student and Family Supports: BPEA continued providing social-emotional supports, behavioral interventions, and wraparound services to address student needs. Educational partners reported that students benefited from individualized support, positive relationships with staff, and access to academic, behavioral, and social-emotional resources. While these actions contributed to improvements in student connectedness, safety, and support systems,

the school recognizes the need to strengthen the consistency and fidelity of PBIS implementation across programs. To support this effort, BPEA has partnered with Fresno County Superintendent of Schools to provide a comprehensive PBIS refresh and staff training during the 2026-27 school year, with the goal of building a more cohesive and sustainable system of positive behavioral supports.

**Action 2.4 Student Activities:** School sites continued to provide student activities, recognition opportunities, and engagement events designed to strengthen school connectedness and promote a positive school culture. Implementation varied across programs, with elementary and adult education programs generally reporting stronger participation and satisfaction with student engagement opportunities. Educational partner feedback from BPHS identified opportunities to expand student activities, electives, recreation, and schoolwide events to further strengthen student engagement and connectedness.

**Actions 2.5 Attendance Initiatives:** BPEA continued implementing a comprehensive attendance program that included ongoing attendance monitoring, family outreach, incentives, student recognition, and enforcement of the Board-approved attendance policy. These efforts supported improvements in overall attendance and reductions in chronic absenteeism among several student groups, including Hispanic students, Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students, and Students with Disabilities.

**Actions 2.8 School Health and Safety and 2.9 Facilities:** BPEA maintained safe and supportive learning environments through ongoing health, safety, security, and facility maintenance efforts. Educational partners frequently cited attentive staff, controlled campus access, and school safety procedures as important factors contributing to students' sense of safety and well-being.

**Action 2.10 Organizational Development:** BPEA leadership teams continued to strengthen organizational systems, communication structures, and operational practices across all programs. Through ongoing collaboration with Fresno County Superintendent of Schools and internal leadership development efforts, administrators and teacher leaders engaged in coaching, professional learning, and continuous improvement activities designed to support a more facilitative leadership model. These efforts helped strengthen program alignment, improve decision-making processes, and build leadership capacity across the organization.

## **Challenges**

**Actions 2.1 Parent Engagement and 2.2 Parent Engagement–Targeted Supports:** Family participation in surveys and formal decision-making opportunities remained below desired levels, with educational partners identifying survey accessibility, technology barriers, and survey design as challenges. Through its participation in the Community Engagement Initiative (CEI), BPEA identified family engagement as a primary problem of practice and developed a plan to increase meaningful family participation during the 2026-27 school year. Planned facility improvements and an expanded campus environment are also expected to create additional opportunities for family involvement and community connection.

**Action 2.4 Student Activities:** Educational partners expressed a desire for expanded student engagement opportunities, including additional electives, recreational activities, school-wide events, sports, and student recognition programs. While BPEA successfully provided a variety of activities and engagement opportunities, feedback from students, families, and staff identified opportunities to expand enrichment offerings, particularly at BPHS and AHS. Elective programming remained a challenge across all programs due to staffing, scheduling, and enrollment constraints. Planned facility improvements, including an expanded campus environment with green space, are expected to support additional student activities, recreation, and community-building opportunities in the future.

**Actions 2.3 SEL and Mental Health, 2.7 Student and Family Supports, and 2.10 Organizational Development:** Educational partners identified ongoing challenges related to staffing stability, staff capacity, and consistently meeting the complex academic, behavioral, and social-emotional needs of students. These challenges varied across programs and included teacher and leadership turnover at BPHS, leadership transitions at BPE, and staff and leadership turnover at AHS. Survey feedback highlighted the importance of maintaining strong student-adult

relationships, increasing individualized support, and ensuring consistent systems of support across programs. BPEA will continue strengthening organizational capacity and support structures to improve continuity of services and student outcomes.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

Several Goal 2 actions experienced material variances between budgeted and estimated actual expenditures during the 2025-26 school year. These variances were primarily the result of changes in staffing allocations, actual program implementation costs, student and family support needs, and facility-related expenditures. BPEA did not receive or incorporate Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant (LREBG) funds into the 2025-26 LCAP. There were no material differences between the planned and estimated actual percentages of Improved Services.

Action 2.2 Parent Engagement–Targeted Support: Budgeted expenditures of \$10,000 increased to estimated actual expenditures of \$79,447. The increase was due to expanded staffing and communication supports provided to strengthen family outreach, engagement, and two-way communication with families.

Action 2.3 SEL and Mental Health: Budgeted expenditures of \$400,877 decreased to estimated actual expenditures of \$283,039. The decrease was primarily due to staffing and implementation costs being lower than originally projected while continuing to provide social-emotional learning and mental health supports to students.

Action 2.5 Attendance Initiatives: Budgeted expenditures of \$241,175 decreased to estimated actual expenditures of \$141,668. The decrease was due to lower-than-anticipated staffing and program costs associated with attendance monitoring, outreach, and intervention efforts.

Action 2.7 Student and Family Supports: Budgeted expenditures of \$22,754 increased to estimated actual expenditures of \$74,917. The increase was due to expanded staffing and support services provided to students and families to address barriers to attendance, engagement, and academic success.

Action 2.8 School Health and Safety: Budgeted expenditures of \$119,855 decreased to estimated actual expenditures of \$63,378. The decrease was due to lower-than-anticipated costs associated with health, safety, and operational activities during the school year.

Action 2.9 Facilities: Budgeted expenditures of \$469,241 increased to estimated actual expenditures of \$526,539. The increase was due to additional facility maintenance, repair, and operational costs incurred to maintain safe and functional learning environments for students and staff.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

**Effective Actions**

Actions 2.3 SEL and Mental Health, 2.5 Attendance Initiatives, 2.6 Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS), and 2.7 Student and Family Supports: These actions were effective in improving student engagement, attendance, and school climate outcomes. Chronic absenteeism declined from 57.4% to 50.7% overall, with particularly notable improvement among Students with Disabilities, whose chronic absenteeism rate declined from 58.7% to 38.3%. Improvements were also observed among Homeless students, Hispanic students, Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students, and White students. Climate survey results demonstrated increased perceptions of safety and connectedness across many grade levels, including notable gains in connectedness among elementary and high school students.

Educational partner feedback consistently highlighted the importance of supportive relationships with teachers, counselors, and other caring adults, as well as access to individualized academic, behavioral, and social-emotional supports. While opportunities remain to strengthen PBIS implementation, these results indicate that student support services, attendance interventions, and social-emotional supports positively contributed to student engagement and school climate.

Actions 2.8 School Health and Safety and 2.9 Facilities: These actions were effective in maintaining safe and supportive learning environments for students and staff. Facility inspection scores improved from 93.83% to 97.16% at the TK-8 campus and from 96.72% to 99.27% at the high school campus. Additionally, the school maintained a 0% expulsion rate for all students and numerically significant student groups. Educational partner feedback consistently identified attentive staff, controlled campus access, and school safety procedures as important contributors to students' sense of safety and well-being. These outcomes demonstrate the effectiveness of the school's efforts to maintain safe, healthy, and well-maintained learning environments.

### **Somewhat Effective Actions**

Actions 2.1 Parent Engagement and 2.2 Parent Engagement–Targeted Supports: These actions were somewhat effective in promoting family engagement. Educational partners reported positive relationships between families and school staff and valued regular communication regarding student progress and well-being. However, family participation in surveys and formal decision-making opportunities remained below desired levels, increasing from 6% to 10% but remaining well below the long-term target. Educational partners identified survey accessibility, technology barriers, and participation challenges as obstacles to broader engagement. As a result, BPEA identified family engagement as a primary problem of practice through its Community Engagement Initiative (CEI) work and developed strategies to increase meaningful participation during the 2026-27 school year.

Action 2.4 Student Activities: This action was somewhat effective in promoting student connectedness and engagement. School sites continued to provide student activities, recognition opportunities, and engagement events, and survey results indicated that many students value opportunities for recreation, social connection, and schoolwide activities. However, educational partners expressed a desire for expanded electives, enrichment opportunities, recreational activities, sports, and student recognition programs, particularly at BPHS and AHS. Staffing, scheduling, and enrollment limitations restricted the school's ability to expand these opportunities during the year. Continued attention to student engagement and enrichment will help strengthen connectedness across programs.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

No substantive changes were made to Goal 2, its metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the 2026-27 school year. Analysis of implementation, outcome data, educational partner feedback, and climate survey results indicated that the existing actions remain aligned to the goal of ensuring that students, families, and staff feel supported, recognized, and connected to the BPEA school community.

While the overall goal structure remains unchanged, BPEA will refine implementation in several areas based on lessons learned during the 2025-26 school year. Planned improvements include increased efforts to strengthen family engagement through the Community Engagement Initiative (CEI), a comprehensive PBIS refresh and staff training supported through Fresno County Superintendent of Schools coaching and technical assistance, expanded mental health and student support services, and continued efforts to increase student engagement through enrichment opportunities, electives, and schoolwide activities.

## Goal Analysis for 2025-26

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

The actions outlined in Goal 3 supported progress toward the goal that BPEA students will be more aware of their strengths, interests, and feel a sense of ownership and membership within the community. During the 2025-26 school year, all five Goal 3 actions were actively implemented. These actions focused on expanding community partnerships, strengthening Learning Through Internships (LTI), providing Leave to Learn opportunities, increasing college and career exploration, and supporting student recruitment and connectedness across BPEA programs.

**Successes**

Action 3.1 Community Partnerships: BPEA continued to strengthen community partnerships that provided students with real-world learning experiences and exposure to college and career pathways. Partnerships supported internship placements, field trips, career exploration activities, and opportunities for students to connect classroom learning to future goals.

Action 3.2 Learning Through Internships: Learning Through Internships remained a cornerstone of the BPEA model. Educational partners reported that students participating in internships developed greater confidence, workplace readiness skills, and awareness of potential career pathways. Freshman students engaged in preparatory activities designed to help them research careers and prepare for future internship placements.

Action 3.3 Leave to Learn Activities: Field trips and experiential learning opportunities provided students with opportunities to apply classroom learning in real-world settings. Educational partners noted that students benefited from experiences that were directly connected to academic content and career exploration.

Action 3.4 College and Career Exploration: BPEA continued to provide students with exposure to postsecondary opportunities through college and career exploration activities, dual enrollment opportunities, and career-focused coursework. Students participated in college and career events throughout the year, and BPE students engaged in college campus visits designed to build awareness of postsecondary options. School counselors also worked directly with students, including individualized transition planning with eighth-grade students, to support preparation for high school, college, and career pathways. Educational partners reported that students became increasingly engaged in planning for their futures and gained valuable experience navigating college and career expectations.

Action 3.5 Student Recruitment: Advisory programs, exhibitions, and other schoolwide activities helped students develop a stronger sense of ownership, accountability, and connection to the school community. Advisors supported students' academic progress and future goals, while community outreach events helped increase awareness of BPEA programs and support student recruitment efforts.

### **Challenges**

Actions 3.1 Community Partnerships and 3.3 Leave to Learn Activities: Opportunities for extended travel experiences and enrichment activities varied across programs. BPE successfully utilized internal transportation, ELO-P, and Expanded Learning Programs to provide students with college visits, field trips, and other enrichment opportunities. Educational partners identified opportunities to expand participation in these experiences at BPHS, where staffing capacity, fundraising efforts, and program participation limited access to some activities during the school year.

Action 3.2 Learning Through Internships: At BPHS, internship placement opportunities were sometimes limited by workplace regulations, including OSHA requirements and restrictions affecting underage students. Educational partners also noted that family circumstances, cultural expectations, and outside responsibilities occasionally created barriers to student participation. While BPE and AHS do not currently operate formal Learning Through Internship programs, BPEA will continue exploring opportunities to expand real-world learning experiences across programs.

Actions 3.4 College and Career Exploration and 3.5 Student Recruitment: Educational partners emphasized the importance of maintaining high expectations while providing the academic, social-emotional, and college and career supports students need to be successful. Preliminary assessment results demonstrated encouraging academic growth, suggesting that students responded positively to increased expectations. Moving forward, BPEA will continue strengthening supports that help students remain engaged, identify future pathways, and successfully prepare for college, career, and life beyond high school.

Action 3.5 Student Recruitment: Continued efforts are needed to strengthen student connectedness, engagement, and awareness of future opportunities both within and beyond school. Educational partner feedback highlighted the importance of helping students explore their interests, build meaningful relationships, and connect their learning to future college, career, and life goals.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

Goal 3 expenditures were generally implemented as planned during the 2025-26 school year. BPEA did not receive or incorporate Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant (LREBG) funds into the 2025-26 LCAP. There were no material differences between the planned and estimated actual percentages of Improved Services.

Action 3.4 College and Career Exploration: Budgeted expenditures of \$98,750 decreased to estimated actual expenditures of \$49,406. The decrease was primarily due to lower-than-anticipated staffing and program implementation costs associated with college and career exploration activities during the school year. Despite the reduced expenditures, BPEA continued to provide students with college and career exploration opportunities, including dual enrollment, career awareness activities, and postsecondary planning supports.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

### Effective Actions

Actions 3.1 Community Partnerships, 3.3 Leave to Learn Activities, and 3.4 College and Career Exploration: These actions were effective in providing students with opportunities to explore college, career, and community pathways beyond the traditional classroom. Students participated in college and career events, college campus visits, community-based learning experiences, and other enrichment activities designed to connect learning to future goals. Graduate outcomes data demonstrated positive postsecondary outcomes, with 57% of Adult High School graduates enrolling in two-year colleges, 10% enrolling in four-year colleges, 28% pursuing vocational opportunities, and no graduates reporting as undecided or unknown. Educational partner feedback emphasized the value of real-world learning experiences, meaningful adult relationships, and opportunities that help students connect their interests and learning to future aspirations. These results indicate that community partnerships, enrichment activities, and college and career exploration opportunities positively supported student readiness for life beyond high school.

### Somewhat Effective Actions

Actions 3.2 Learning Through Internships and 3.5 Student Recruitment: These actions were somewhat effective in supporting student engagement and exploration of future pathways. At BPHS, Learning Through Internship opportunities provided valuable real-world experiences; however, placement options were sometimes limited by workplace regulations, student availability, and participation barriers. Educational partner feedback also highlighted the importance of strengthening student connectedness, engagement, and awareness of future opportunities. While advisory programs, exhibitions, outreach activities, and recruitment efforts supported student engagement, stakeholders identified opportunities to expand enrichment experiences, real-world learning opportunities, and student participation across programs. Continued refinement of these actions will help ensure that more students can access and benefit from the personalized learning experiences central to the BPEA model.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

No substantive changes were made to Goal 3, its metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the 2026-27 school year. Analysis of implementation, educational partner feedback, and program outcomes indicates that the existing actions remain aligned to the goal of increasing student awareness of their strengths, interests, and sense of ownership and membership within the community. BPEA will continue implementing the current actions while monitoring effectiveness through ongoing reflection and continuous improvement processes.

**Additional Concentration Grant Funding**

Additional concentration add-on funding will be utilized to increase the number of staff providing direct services to students at all school sites in the LEA. The determination of how these funds were utilized was based on a comprehensive needs assessment and educational partner input to identify the most significant staffing needs by the site to support our most at-promise students.

These actions are outlined in the Goals and Actions sections of the LCAP as follows:

**2.3 Social Emotional Learning and Mental Health Support**

Big Picture Educational Academy is a single site LEA with an enrollment of unduplicated student groups greater than 55%. Big Picture Educational Academy is using the additional concentration grant add-on funding received to increase the number of staff who provide direct services to students by adding a Coordinator of Social Emotional Learning. The direct increased/improved services that the additional position will provide to the students include the coordination of SEL curriculum and instruction, seeking feedback from students and teachers on SEL programming, and support for teachers in implementing SEL. The addition of the SEL Coordinator increases the support available to meet the needs of our low-income students, foster youth, and English learners, in alignment with 2.3 Social Emotional Learning and Mental Health Support.

The LEA reviews the original estimated cost for the action and determines that had it hired additional staff to collect and analyze data and to coordinate supports for students that estimated actual cost would have been \$169,500 due to a cost of living adjustment.   - This amount is the total of the Planned Expenditures for Contributing Actions (LCFF Funds) column.
- **5. Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services**
  - This percentage is the total of the Planned Percentage of Improved Services column.
- **Planned Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the coming school year (4 divided by 1, plus 5)**
  - This percentage is calculated by dividing the Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (4) by the Projected LCFF Base Grant (1), converting the quotient to a percentage, and adding it to the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5).

### **Contributing Actions Annual Update Table**

Pursuant to *EC* Section 42238.07(c)(2), if the Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (4) is less than the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and Concentration Grants (6), the LEA is required to calculate the difference between the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) and the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (7). - **Difference Between Planned and Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (Subtract 5 from 8)**
  - This amount is the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) subtracted from the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).

## LCFF Carryover Table

- **10. Total Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the Current School Year (6 divided by 9 plus Carryover %)**
  - This percentage is the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and/or Concentration Grants (6) divided by the Estimated Actual LCFF Base Grant (9) plus the LCFF Carryover – Percentage from the prior year.
- **11. Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (7 divided by 9, plus 8)**
  - This percentage is the Total Estimated Actual Expenditures for Contributing Actions (7) divided by the LCFF Funding (9), then converting the quotient to a percentage and adding the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).
- **12. LCFF Carryover — Dollar Amount LCFF Carryover (Subtract 11 from 10 and multiply by 9)**
