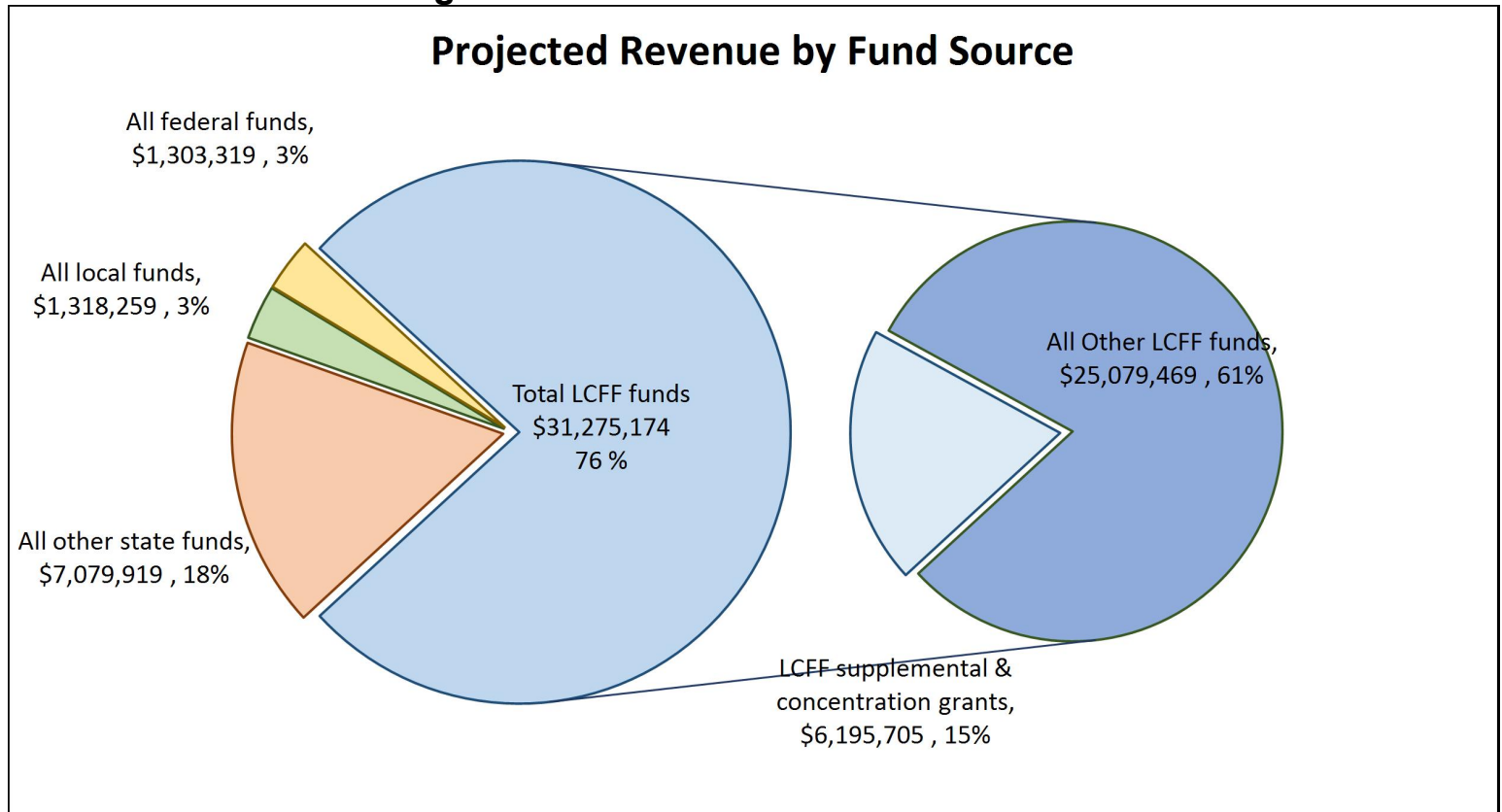

Budget Overview for the 2026-27 School Year

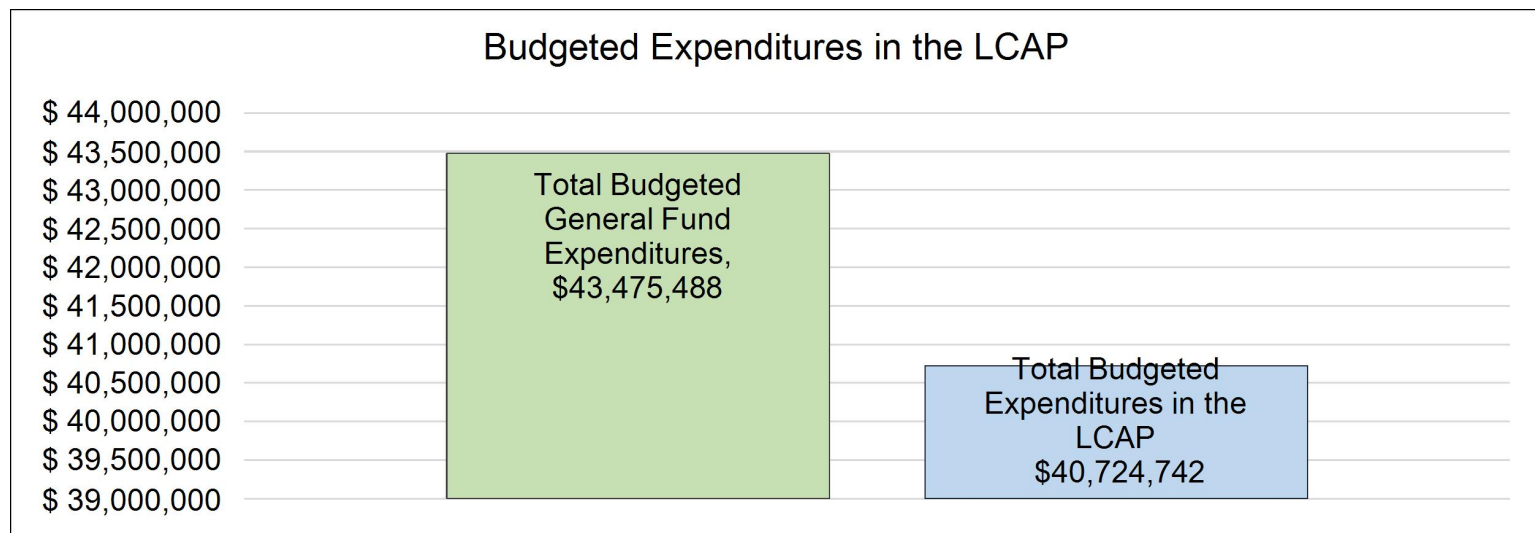


This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Kingsburg Elementary Charter School District expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

The text description for the above chart is as follows: The total revenue projected for Kingsburg Elementary Charter School District is \$40,976,671, of which \$31,275,174 is Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), \$7,079,919 is other state funds, \$1,318,259 is local funds, and \$1,303,319 is federal funds. Of the \$31,275,174 in LCFF Funds, \$6,195,705 is generated based on the enrollment of high needs students (Foster Youth, English learner, and low-income students).

The budgeted expenditures that are not included in the LCAP will be used for the following:

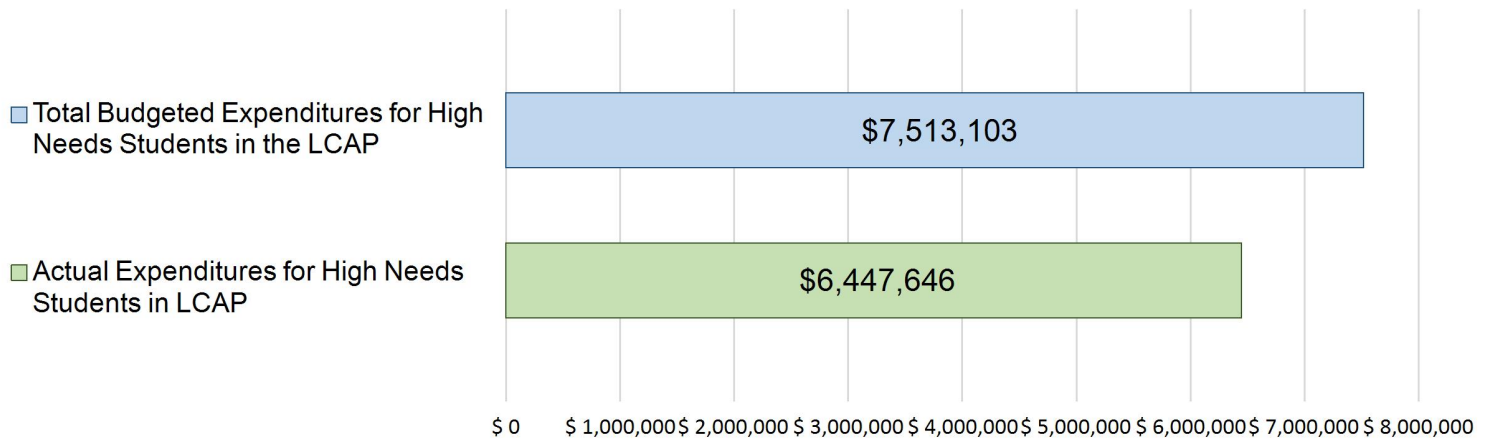
Increased or Improved Services for High Needs Students in the LCAP for the 2026-27 School Year

The difference between the budgeted and actual expenditures of \$1,065,457 had the following impact on Kingsburg Elementary Charter School District's ability to increase or improve services for high needs students:

The District utilized one-time funds to cover the remaining balances at this time. The District utilized the Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant and Student Support and Professional Development Block Grant to provide additional services for students. In all, students received more resources than what was originally budgeted.

General Information

The Kingsburg Elementary Charter School District, serving approximately 2,132 students, supports a distinctive rural community of about 13,128 residents in California's Central San Joaquin Valley. It is a town where parents, the school community, and the citizens of Kingsburg have committed themselves to a high standard of education for their children. The community's city government and the school district have cooperated to co-develop city parks in conjunction with school playgrounds, co-sponsored afterschool programs, and participate in each other's planning teams. Local citizens and businesses have donated tennis courts, trees, playground equipment, and even school supplies and clothing for students in need. The student population of the district is a mixture of children of farmworkers and farmers, doctors, nurses, and custodians, small and large business owners, factory workers, salespeople, and educators. The diversity is broad, however, as diverse as the backgrounds may be, the town's citizens are singularly committed to the education of its children. The school district, in existence since 1874, takes pride in meeting the needs of all its students, and as a result, the district enjoys the overwhelming support of its parents, teachers, staff, and the community at large.

In 1996, the Kingsburg Joint Union Elementary District became the second charter school district in the state. The charter is a reflection of the support expressed by the district's employees and the citizens of Kingsburg. It also reflects the constant efforts of the district to prepare students to become productive citizens in the 21st century. The district's mission is simple, "We will find a way for ALL students to learn," is lived daily in taking to heart the challenge of preparing children to communicate effectively, work collaboratively, think creatively and critically, gather, use, and produce information; make informed, responsible decisions; become life-long learners, and enthusiastically embrace challenges and responsibilities.

Placed in the context of creating professional learning communities, these overriding concepts are encouraged by the support of parents and families, drawing its standards from the traditional small-town atmosphere so cherished by the citizens of Kingsburg. Indicators of this support include: 100% of the parents sign the Parent/Student/Charter District Compact, 100% of the credentialed employees in the district support working in the charter district, and 100% of the classified employees support working in the charter district. It was held by all stakeholders in the initial charter petition and continues to be held today, that being a charter would set the school district apart and make it even more special in the educational community. The district's unique grade level configuration by grade span instead of neighborhood schools, allows students to attend school together as they move up through the different levels. Washington School is home to all of the district's preschool, TK, and kindergarten students. Roosevelt serves students in first grade. Lincoln serves students in grades two and three, and Reagan School is home to all of the district's fourth, fifth, and sixth grade students. Students in grades seven and eight attend Rafer Johnson Jr. High School, proudly named after long-time Kingsburg resident and Olympic gold medalist, Rafer Johnson.

The innovative and effective education programs, which include music and art as well as career technology and STEAM implementation have contributed to KECSD students performing well on the performance levels on state indicators as per the California School Dashboard, especially when compared to our local surrounding school districts. The charter fosters innovation in the area of literacy development and technology. The opportunity to have more flexibility with programs and staffing, combined with open enrollment were powerful motivators in meeting the needs of students and parents in the rural backdrop of Kingsburg.

Open enrollment has been a signature practice of the charter since its inception. Parents and students are welcome from all districts, and students that reside in Kingsburg have the opportunity to transfer to any other district without going through the transfer process. The charter allows us to affect the lives of more families and students. In this community, parents truly feel they are ultimately responsible for the education of their children. Through our charter, the district becomes partners in the education of its students. The individual responsibilities of each group – parents, district, and students – are enumerated in the Charter District/Parent/Student Compact, making it everyone's job to ensure student growth and achievement. Each year, this compact represents 100% parent and student participation.

Kingsburg is structured as a community-aligned school system instead of a neighborhood school system. All of the students move through the grade levels as one unit. This allows each grade level to provide the most effective education program because of the unity formed with each stakeholder in the district and community. For families that want an alternative type of education program, students may attend Central Valley Home School. It is the desire of the community (frequently reiterated in annual parent surveys) to maintain its TK-8 continuity structure. By mandated necessity, as seen by the community, the structure of the district's schools dictates that if one school is a charter, the expectation is that all schools have charter status, thus virtually requiring the need that if there is going to be a charter, then it must be an all-charter district.

Kingsburg Elementary Charter School District has demonstrated what a "stand-alone" district can accomplish as a charter. Through our flexibility, the implementation of researched-based programs and change has allowed us to ensure the highest quality of education and educational opportunities are quickly put in place for our students. The community and staff have embraced the charter status and developed into a community-wide professional learning community that proudly stands together for each member of the community. One example of this commitment is exemplified by the development of Island Community Day School. Instead of sending students to county programs, Kingsburg wants to keep its students to rehabilitate them through restorative justice and maintenance of their academic programs. Kingsburg is the only TK-8 district in Fresno County with a Community Day School. It is worth noting that the district received approval of its fifth multiple-year cycle as an all-charter district. Also, Island Community Day School has been designated as an Equity Multiplier school.

The district's status as an all-charter district has become a core value in both our school system and the community at large. Another way to look at the district's involvement as a charter may be to note that no child who has started kindergarten in this school district has ever known or experienced a school system that is not a charter system. From our mindset to our conversations to even the visual representations on the side of our school buses, we proclaim Kingsburg Elementary Charter School District as a source of pride from who we are and what we have become. Being a charter district represents a clear and encouraging call to a 'can-do' spirit and willingness to pursue what is best for children.

Reflections: Annual Performance

A reflection on annual performance based on a review of the California School Dashboard (Dashboard) and local data.

Reflection on the 2025-2026 school year. To determine the most effective use of our LREBG funds, KECSD conducted our annual comprehensive needs assessment analyzing state and local data, including CAASPP scores, ELPAC results, and local diagnostic assessments. After reviewing the data in the California School Dashboard for the testing year of 2024-2025, our district discovered the following successes for the 1,300 students that took the assessment. In ELA, our district increased by 5.5 points and scored 9.8 points higher than the state average. In Math, our district increased 3.2 points and scored 9.6 points higher than the state average. In the area of Chronic Absenteeism, our district scored 15.9% better than the statewide average. For the Suspension Rate category, our district suspensions declined by 0.6% and had 0.1% more suspensions than the statewide average. When analyzing our overall Math and ELA test scores, our district scored higher than the state average in the following subgroups: EL, Hispanic, Homeless, SED, and Two or More Races.

While we are proud of our ongoing successes, a thorough review of this year's data has identified key areas requiring focused attention, specifically regarding our ELPI trajectory and the feedback gathered from our recent teacher and student climate surveys. Our recent drop in ELPI performance stems directly from our past successes; having successfully exited a large number of English Learners in previous years, our remaining EL population naturally consists of students facing greater language challenges. We are now focused on refining our Integrated and Designated ELD supports to address the specific, intensive needs of this current group and resume our progress toward our 63% target. Although overall district culture remains exceptionally strong across adult stakeholders and younger learners, we recognize the unique developmental challenges of the middle school transition and are making it a priority to reinvigorate the sense of belonging for our 7th and 8th-grade cohort following a slight decline in their recent survey results. Although engaging students in summer learning proved challenging last year due to lower-than-expected enrollment, registration has significantly rebounded this year with an increase of 80 students.

During the LCAP development process, the district utilized a comprehensive online survey to gather quantitative and qualitative data from our educational partners. The survey yielded 220 total responses, ensuring a broad representation of voices across our community.

A summary of the feedback provided by specific educational partners

After analyzing data from our educational partners (PAC, DELAC, SSC, ELAC, Classified Staff, Certificated Staff, and students), a noticeable pattern and trend existed. Data from both certificated and classified staff members were collected using a google form survey and spreadsheet. Input from other educational partner groups (PAC, DELAC, SSC and ELAC) was also taken into account through meetings, and also through the use of a Google form survey. When analyzing the priority matrix across the LCAP's five goals, clear trends emerged across all partner groups. The highest overall priorities identified by our community for Goal 1 was providing properly credentialed teachers for our students. Because this was a top priority, the district will maintain funding for highly credentialed teachers and specialized classes for our neediest students. Paraprofessional support was the top priority for Goal 2. The survey data made it explicitly clear that educational partners view Paraprofessionals as vital to student learning, emerging as the highest-voted priority for this goal. As a result, the district is maintaining paraprofessional support across school sites. We ensured that funding for Interpreters for English Learner families remains a protected action to improve accessible communication. With an overwhelming survey respondents prioritizing it, Technology and 21st Century Learning emerged as a nearly unanimous priority across all educational partner groups for Goal 3. Influenced by this strong consensus from our

teachers, classified staff, and parent advisory groups, the district is maintaining its primary investments in student technology access and expanding after-school enrichment programs designed to foster College and Career Readiness skills. This ensures our students have the tools necessary to master California State Standards and remain competitive in a 21st-century landscape. Mental Health and School Climate were the most critical priority in the entire district survey in regards to Goal 4. Influenced directly by this data from parents, staff, and students, the district is committing funds to maintain full-time counselors and BSA's at every site, as well as preserving our psych interns. Similarly, strong support for MTSS and Attendance Liaisons led to the continuation of our Board Certified Behavior Analyst (BCBA) and community liaison support roles. Goal 5 was developed specifically to allocate Equity Multiplier funding for Island Community Day School. During targeted engagement sessions with Island Community Day School staff and open to parents, a clear consensus emerged that absenteeism is the most critical barrier to student success at this site. Influenced directly by this site-level feedback, and subsequently endorsed by the Superintendent's Cabinet, the district dedicated Goal 5 exclusively to improving absenteeism. To address this partner-identified priority, the district is utilizing these funds to heavily invest in school connectedness, a proven driver of daily attendance. Specifically, funds will provide school-branded clothing, engaging physical education equipment (volleyball and soccer), and positive campus branding (metal signage) to foster a deep sense of belonging, reduce behavioral suspensions, and ultimately motivate consistent daily attendance. The top priorities for each of the LCAP's five goals included:

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

The LEA used the following rating scale to determine the LEA's progress in implementing the actions to achieve the articulated goal. Ratings were based on an analysis of both inputs from educational partners and metrics.

Rating Scale (lowest to highest): 1 – Exploration and Research Phase; 2 – Beginning Development; 3 – Initial Implementation; 4 – Full Implementation; 5 – Full Implementation and Sustainability.

The actions outlined in Goal One supported the progress toward meeting the goal of providing basic services to all schools and students, including core instruction and instruction in the visual and performing arts.

The actions outlined in Goal One supported the progress toward meeting the district's broad goal of providing basic services to all schools and students, including core instruction and instruction in the visual and performing arts. Overall, there were no substantive differences in the planned actions compared to the actual implementation for the actions in Goal 1.

Actions Rated 5: Full Implementation and Sustainability

For the following actions, there were no substantive differences in the planned actions compared to the actual implementation:

Action 1.1 - Closing the Achievement Gap: Implementation included providing supplemental instructional resources and Developmental Reading Assessment (DRA) kits, alongside the DIBELS assessment, to support the core curriculum aligned to CA standards. To ensure effective use of these tools, teachers were trained in administering DIBELS, collecting the data, and analyzing students' reading levels to identify early literacy focus areas. Successes: A major success of this implementation was the effective use of data within the Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) Cycle of Inquiry; teachers successfully utilized this diagnostic data during Multi-tiered Systems of Support (MTSS), Response to Intervention (RTI), and after-school programs to successfully scaffold instruction for Low-Income and English Learner students. Challenges: A relevant challenge was ensuring that all new staff members were consistently calibrated on DRA/DIBELS data collection and training protocols throughout the year.

Action 2 - Supervisor of Operations: Our supervisor of operations provides quality oversight and assistance to our night custodial staff. Action 1.2 - Supervisor of Operations: Implementation included maintaining the Assistant Supervisor of Operations position. Successes: This position successfully provided quality oversight and hands-on assistance to our night custodial staff, ensuring facilities were well-prepared for daily instruction. Challenges: Adapting to absences in personnel required shifting operational schedules and duties.

Action 3 - Transportation: Transportation is successfully offered to all students by Southwest Transportation to and from school, as well as for after-school programs and sporting events. Action 1.3 - Transportation: Implementation involved contracting with Southwest Transportation to provide access to consistent, reliable, and safe bussing for students living beyond the designated district-provided bussing service area. Successes: We successfully offered reliable transportation to and from school, as well as for after-school programs and sporting events, removing a significant barrier to attendance and engagement for our Low-Income and Foster Youth students. Challenges: Routing logistics for after-school and extra-curricular events occasionally presented scheduling challenges due to varying activity dismissal times.

Action 4 - Staffing: The district maintains solid, ongoing HR practices-including robust procedures for hiring and recruitment-leading to the retention of highly qualified staff. Action 1.4 - Staffing: Implementation focused on executing robust Human Resources procedures for the hiring and recruitment of properly credentialed staff. Successes: The district successfully maintained solid, ongoing HR practices that led to the retention of highly qualified and fully credentialed teachers for our students. Challenges: The statewide teacher shortage continues to pose a challenge in recruiting specialized credential holders (Example = TK Teachers).

Action 5 - Special Education: Our Special Education program consistently provides individualized support to all students based on their identified needs. Action 1.5 - Special Education: Implementation centered on adhering to state and federal Child Find mandates to identify, evaluate, and provide a Free Appropriate Public Education (FAPE) to students with disabilities. This included providing specific designated services and resources, such as speech therapy and counseling, tailored to individual student needs. Successes: Our Special Education program consistently and successfully provided individualized support and necessary accommodations, guaranteeing access to the general curriculum for all students with Individualized Education Plans (IEPs). Challenges: Coordinating schedules between general education and special education providers to ensure seamless push-in and pull-out services requires constant logistical adjustments.

Action Below Rated 4: Full Implementation

Action 6 - Basic Services: KECSD will continue to provide and refine our intervention supports to reduce achievement gaps. A Response to Intervention (RTI) system is established at each school site to target and support our EL, LI, and Foster Youth (FY) students. Notably, our SWD subgroup made significant growth in ELA and math. There were no substantive differences in the planned action compared to the actual implementation. Action 1.6 - Basic Services: Implementation included providing basic services, additional support, and targeted interventions through an established RTI system at each site to ensure all students could access state standards. Specifically, Ronald Reagan Elementary utilized small group reteaching for Math and ELA; teachers analyzed PLC data to ensure Students with Disabilities (SWD) and English Learners received immediate, credentialed-teacher-led small group instruction after assessments. Successes: A major

success of these targeted basic services and intervention efforts was the significant growth seen in both ELA and Math for our SWD subgroup. Challenges: A continuing challenge is maximizing the master schedule to ensure small group reteaching occurs without interrupting core tier-one instructional minutes.

Actions Below Rated 5: Full Implementation and Sustainability

Action 7 - Facilities: Facilities are excellently maintained, as indicated by the most recent FIT report. Action 1.7 - Facilities: Implementation involved the ongoing maintenance and upgrading of classrooms and district facilities. Successes: Facilities are excellently maintained, as evidenced by a 100% rating on the most recent SARC Facility Inspection Tool (FIT) report. Challenges: Managing the timelines of larger upgrade projects (Example=Solar Project) to avoid disrupting the instructional day.

Action 8 - Preschool: The preschool program continues to run according to clear, established policies and procedures. Action 1.8 - Preschool: Implementation provided high-quality preschool services and resources to effectively prepare early learners for kindergarten. Successes: The preschool program successfully operated in alignment with clear, established policies and procedures, establishing a strong educational foundation for our youngest learners. Challenges: Communicating program requirements and engaging families continuously throughout the school year.

Action 9 - Lunch Program: The district lunch program consistently provides healthy meals in accordance with state and federal guidelines.

Action 1.9 - Lunch Program: Implementation ensured a quality meal program to provide healthy and nutritious breakfasts and lunches every school day. Successes: The district lunch program consistently provided healthy meals in strict accordance with state and federal nutritional guidelines. Challenges: Navigating occasional product substitutions while still meeting strict nutritional and dietary compliance standards.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

Action 1.1 - Closing the Achievement Gap: The District originally projected expenditures, but estimated actuals were significantly less. This material difference was primarily due to a strategic shift in how some of our intervention and supplemental supports were funded; for example, maximizing our Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELOP) funds to offset costs. Furthermore, our Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) became highly efficient at targeting instruction, which resulted in lower-than-anticipated spending on redundant supplemental diagnostic materials and supplies. Action 1.6 - Basic Services: The District projected expenditures, but estimated actuals were much lower. This discrepancy is largely attributed to using other one time monies at this time for personnel and materials. Once those monies run out, they will use our LCFF funds. Action 1.7 - Facilities: The District experienced a large material difference in this action, with budgeted expenditures exceeding estimated actuals. This difference was due to shifted timelines for several planned facility upgrades and maintenance projects. Supply chain delays for specific materials and contractor scheduling constraints required the District to defer some of these facility projects into the 2026-27 school year. The District recognizes these differences and will continue to adjust projections and align funding to ensure all student needs are fully met in the coming school year.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

The LEA used the following rating scale to determine the effectiveness of the actions to achieve the articulated goal. Ratings were based on an analysis of both inputs from educational partners and metrics. Rating Scale (lowest to highest): 1 - Not Effective; 2 - Somewhat Effective; 3 - Effective.

Overall, the actions outlined in Goal One were Effective (3) in making progress towards the LEA's goal to provide basic services to all schools and students, operate with increased efficiency, and maintain high-quality facilities.

Metric(s): CAASPP Data, CaDashboard, FIT Report & Survey

Contributing Actions

Action 1.1 - Closing the Achievement Gap: Effectiveness: Somewhat Effective to Effective. This action is designed to support our Low-Income (LI) and English Learner (EL) students. When measuring effectiveness using CAASPP data (Metrics 1.1 and 1.2), we see mixed but promising results for our unduplicated groups. EL students saw a notable 13.7-point increase in ELA, indicating that the supplemental resources and targeted MTSS/RTI interventions are working well for literacy. However, EL students decreased by 26 points in Math, and our LI students at Central Valley Home School also saw a decrease in Math. While effective in ELA, the district is actively collaborating with the county office to strengthen our Math approach to ensure this action becomes highly effective across all core subjects for our unduplicated students.

Action 1.3 - Transportation: Effectiveness: Effective. This action was designed to remove barriers to school access specifically for our Foster Youth (FY) and LI populations living beyond standard boundaries. When analyzing Chronic Absenteeism (Metric 1.9) and Attendance Rates (Metric 1.10), this action proved highly effective for our unduplicated student groups. Chronic absenteeism for LI students improved, dropping 1.4% below the baseline to 2.2%. For our FY students, the absenteeism rate dropped to 0% (for a statistically small cohort of <11 students). Furthermore, providing this reliable transportation helped maintain an exceptionally high overall district attendance rate of 99.56% (+0.01% above baseline).

Non-Contributing Actions

Actions 1.5 & 1.6 - Special Education & Basic Services: Effectiveness: Effective. Measured by CAASPP Data (Metrics 1.1 and 1.2), the district's signature Response to Intervention (RTI) practices have proven effective. Our Students with Disabilities (SWD) subgroup increased proficiency and made significant growth overall in both ELA and Math. While there were localized decreases for SWD in ELA at Rafer Johnson and in Math at Ronald Reagan, the overarching district-wide implementation of basic and SPED services continues to successfully close gaps.

Action 1.4 - Staffing: Effectiveness: Effective. As measured by teacher credentialing data (Metric 1.5), the district's recruitment and retention practices are effective. Despite a difficult hiring landscape statewide, KECSD maintained a 94% clearance rate for teaching staff, keeping us well above the county and state averages.

Actions 1.2 & 1.7 - Supervisor of Operations & Facilities: Effectiveness: Effective. Monitored via the SARC FIT Report (Metric 1.7), these actions were highly successful. KECSD's maintenance and operations team effectively followed district guidelines to ensure 100% of facilities were maintained in good repair.

Action 1.8 - Preschool: Effectiveness: Effective. Based on local survey data, the preschool program effectively serves our community. 95.8% of parents indicated that the program makes them feel welcome and treats them like valued partners in their child's early learning.

Action 1.9 - Lunch Program: Effectiveness: Effective. The district effectively provided high-quality, nutritious meals daily, which directly supports student well-being and acts as a foundational pillar for the high attendance rates (Metric 1.10) observed across the district.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

Based on an analysis of current data, reflections on prior practice, and feedback from our educational partners, KECSD has made the following specific changes to the metrics and actions within Goal 1 for the coming year: Metric Changes (DRA Retirement): The Developmental Reading Assessment (DRA), previously tracked as Metric 1.8, will no longer be used as a formal LCAP metric moving forward. This metric was previously referenced to measure the effectiveness of Action 1.1 (Closing the Achievement Gap). While DRA kits and DIBELS will continue to be utilized by teachers for instructional purposes and formative assessment, the formal LCAP metric is being retired as KECSD is no longer in Differentiated Assistance for this area. Metric Alignments for Actions 1.2, 1.3, 1.7, and 1.9: To better

measure effectiveness, Metric 1.9 (Chronic Absenteeism) and Metric 1.10 (Attendance Rate) have been explicitly tied to Action 1.2 (Supervisor of Operations), Action 1.3 (Transportation), Action 1.7 (Facilities), and Action 1.9 (Lunch Program). Reflection on prior practice highlighted that clean and safe facilities, reliable transportation, and consistent, nutritious meal programs directly impact student attendance and reduce chronic absenteeism. The descriptions for these actions have been updated to speak directly to their effectiveness on attendance, particularly for our unduplicated student populations in the contributing actions. Action 1.1 (Closing the Achievement Gap): The narrative was updated to reference "The current CA School Dashboard" rather than the "2023 CA School Dashboard" to ensure alignment with our 2025 data. Additionally, the action narrative was reorganized to cleanly separate the 5 CCR narrative requirements from the LREBG narrative requirements, and the LREBG funding amounts were reconciled to ensure consistency throughout the description. Action 1.3 (Transportation): Similar to Action 1.1, the description was updated to reference "The current CA School Dashboard". We also revised the language to use "identified group" instead of "unduplicated," and clarified that Foster Youth chronic absenteeism data is technically "not reported" due to the cohort size being less than 11 students. Action 1.6 (Basic Services): Based on reflections regarding the performance of our Students with Disabilities (SWD) subgroup, explicit language was added to this action referencing SWD. The action now distinctly outlines the provision of Professional Development for all educational specialists, specifically focused on writing appropriate accommodations and modifications to ensure access to grade-level content and strategic progress monitoring. Action 1.7 (Facilities): The explicit text "Metric 1.7" was removed from the action description narrative for clarity and formatting consistency. Metric 1.2 (Smarter Balanced Math): Based on the requirement to monitor Long-Term English Learners (LTEL) as a distinct pupil subgroup, LTEL performance data has been explicitly added to this metric to ensure we are accurately tracking their specific academic progress.

Goal Analysis [2025-26]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

The actions outlined in Goal Two supported the progress toward meeting the goal of providing focused intervention for students and professional development for staff that supports pedagogy/instructional planning and effective utilization of data to prepare all students for mastery of the state standards. While the core objectives of these actions were successfully carried out, several actions experienced shifts in funding sources or participation levels that slightly altered their planned implementation.

The LEA used the following rating scale to determine the LEA's progress in implementing the actions to achieve the articulated goal. Ratings were based on an analysis of both inputs from educational partners and metrics.

Rating Scale (lowest to highest): 1 – Exploration and Research Phase; 2 – Beginning Development; 3 – Initial Implementation; 4 – Full Implementation; 5 – Full Implementation and Sustainability.

Actions Rated 5: Full Implementation and Sustainability

For the following actions, there were no substantive differences in the planned actions compared to the actual implementation:

Action 2.1 - Preservice Days for Classified and Certificated Staff: Implementation: Preservice days were provided to teachers prior to the start of the school year. Teacher implementation of professional development was monitored throughout the year. Successes: We were successful in delivering all of the planned PD and received positive feedback on the sessions.

Challenges: A challenge was keeping the information shared with teachers relevant throughout the year.

Action 2.2 - Academic Coaches and Training for Staff - Implementation: Academic coaches were deployed to support TK-8th grade. Our K-2 coaches focused on early literacy with the implementation of the DIBELS reading risk screener, which helped our EL and Low-Income student populations, and delivered small-group tutoring and data-driven instructional coaching.

Successes: Coaches successfully supported teachers in implementing evidence-based strategies (such as SIOP and learning acceleration) and conducting effective, site-level data cycles.

Challenges: Equitably distributing coach time across all targeted classrooms to ensure consistent, ongoing support proved logistically challenging at times.

Action 2.3 - Professional Development - Implementation: The district provided ongoing professional development focused on "best first instruction," Social Emotional Learning, math, ela, science, technology, music and Integrated/Designated ELD.

Successes: Grade-level vertical systems were established across the district, allowing teachers to collaborate and align their instructional strategies effectively.

Challenges: Securing substitute teachers to allow for pull-out professional development without overly disrupting the continuity of core classroom instruction.

Action 2.4 - Interpreters - EL - Implementation: This action was designed to provide interpretation services to enhance communication in the classroom and with parents.

Successes: We effectively utilized our existing bilingual EL paraprofessionals to assist with interpreting services, successfully bridging the communication gap for EL families.

Challenges: Relying on instructional paraprofessionals for family interpretation occasionally required them to shift focus away from direct student instructional support during the school day.

Action 2.5 - Designated and Integrated ELD Instruction, Support, Language Acquisition and Professional Development for ELs and LTELs - Implementation: The district provided dedicated ELD instruction daily and integrated ELD across core subjects, supported by our EL Director.

Successes: We successfully implemented regular, targeted PD sessions with the Fresno County Office to create specific ELD lessons and conduct highly effective goal-setting conferences with EL and LTEL students.

Challenges: Accelerating the language acquisition rate for LTELs remains an ongoing instructional challenge despite these systemic supports.

Action 2.6 - Summer Programs - Implementation: The district delivered summer learning opportunities designed to prevent learning loss, including field trips, STEAM programs, and targeted academic interventions.

Successes: We successfully re-engaged students in summer learning, with registration rebounding significantly this year. The educationally-based field trips provided equitable access to rigorous enrichment. Challenges: Fluctuating summer enrollment numbers year-over-year make long-term staffing and resource allocation difficult to predict.

Action 2.7 - Paraprofessionals - Implementation: Paraprofessionals were deployed across sites to provide targeted, small-group, and one-on-one instructional support for Low-Income and EL students.

Successes: Paraprofessionals successfully supported MTSS/RTI blocks, increasing student engagement and providing the immediate feedback necessary to close concept gaps.

Challenges: Maintaining consistent paraprofessional staffing due to localized turnover and daily absences occasionally impacted the consistency of small-group interventions.

Action 2.8 - Intervention and (After-School Intervention), Enrichment Programs and Teacher Training - Implementation: The district expanded intervention and enrichment opportunities, including after-school instruction, VAPA, CTE, STEM, and AVID programs. Successes: We successfully utilized Expanded Learning Opportunity Program (ELOP) funding to seamlessly cover after-school tutoring needs. We were able to increase the number of FTEs in the music department, vastly expanding broad course access from preschool through 8th grade.

Challenges: Aligning after-school intervention schedules with student availability for enrichment programs (like music or sports) to ensure students do not have to choose between academic support and extracurricular engagement.

Action 2.9 - Teacher Induction Program - Implementation: The district provided extra support and mentorship for new teachers through the Teacher Induction Program.

Successes: Participating new teachers successfully demonstrated mastery of teaching standards and were successfully retained within the district.

Challenges: Matching every new teacher with a veteran mentor in their exact subject or grade level is sometimes difficult due to credentialing and availability constraints.

KECSD has committed to provide intervention both academic and mental health for their EL, LI and FY students, while combining that with professional development for their staff to meet the needs of their students due to the gaps in achievement.

While we successfully accomplished the overarching objectives of this goal, there were substantive differences in how certain planned actions were actually implemented. In several instances, variances in available funding, resources, or staffing required the District to adapt our original plans to ensure our students still received the necessary services and support.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

Action 2.1 - Preservice Days for Classified and Certificated Staff: The District did not fully expend the projected amount. This variance occurred because the preservice training days were optional for classified staff, and attendance was lower than initially projected. Action 2.2 - Academic Coaches and Training for Staff: The projected budget was higher than the estimated actuals. We are currently using the Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant one-time funds to pay for two of our academic coaches, but once that money runs out, they will come out of the LCAP funding. Action 2.3 - Professional Development: The District spent less than anticipated on professional development as the District utilized the Educator Effectiveness Block Grant for the LETRS trainings. Although less money was spent, all goals were still completed. Action 2.4 - Interpreters EL: The District did not expend all allocated funds for this action. We were able to effectively utilize our existing EL paraprofessionals to assist with interpreting services for our families, maximizing our current staff capacity and reducing the need for additional outside interpreter expenditures. Action 2.6 - Summer Programs : Estimated actual expenditures were lower than the budgeted amount. Summer program funding for students is being funded through ELOP funds at this time, so not as much is needed from LCAP funds at this time. While summer programs for students are being funded out of ELOP, staff opportunities for EL trainings occurs and does come out of LCFF funds. Action 2.7 - Paraprofessionals: The District spent less than projected for paraprofessional support. This variance was driven by localized staffing turnover and daily position vacancies throughout the school year, which lowered overall personnel costs. Action 2.8 - Intervention and Enrichment Programs: The District did not expend all projected LCFF funds for this action. We strategically utilized Expanded Learning Opportunity Program (ELOP) funding to assist with after-school tutoring costs. We were able to increase the number of FTEs in our music department, though total expenditures still remained below the initial projection. Action 2.9 - Teacher Induction Program: Estimated actual expenditures were slightly higher than budgeted. This was due to a higher-than-expected number of new teachers requiring induction support and mentorship during the 2025-26 school year, necessitating additional funds to cover the required stipends and program costs.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

The LEA used the following rating scale to determine the effectiveness of the actions to achieve the articulated goal. Ratings were based on an analysis of both inputs from educational partners and metrics.

Rating Scale (lowest to highest): 1 – Not Effective; 2 – Somewhat Effective; 3 –Effective.

The actions outlined in Goal Two helped make progress towards the LEA's goal: Provide focused intervention for students and professional development for staff that supports pedagogy/instructional planning and effective utilization of data to prepare all students for mastery of the state standards.

Contributing Actions

Actions 2.1, 2.2, 2.3, 2.6, 2.7, and 2.8 (Preservice Days, Academic Coaches, Professional Development, Summer Programs, Paraprofessionals, and Intervention/Enrichment): Effectiveness: Somewhat Effective. These actions are collectively designed to provide targeted instructional support and intervention to close the achievement gap for our Low-Income (LI) and English Learner (EL) students. When analyzing CAASPP data, the effectiveness for our unduplicated student groups is mixed. EL students showed promising growth, increasing 13.7 points in ELA and 11.8 points in Math. However, the achievement gap is widening for our LI students, who decreased by 7

points in ELA and 4.3 points in Math. Because these core instructional and intervention actions did not prevent a widening of the gap for the LI subgroup, they are more appropriately rated as Somewhat Effective at this time.

Action 2.4 - Interpreters EL: Effectiveness: Effective. This action provides dedicated interpretation services to bridge the communication gap for EL families. Based on local climate surveys and Chronic Absenteeism data—where EL chronic absenteeism improved by 0.4%—this action was effective in maintaining strong family engagement and supporting the environmental conditions necessary for EL student success.

Action 2.5 - Designated and Integrated ELD Instruction: Effectiveness: Somewhat Effective. This action targets the language acquisition of our EL and Long-Term English Learner (LTEL) populations. While EL students showed growth on the CAASPP, ELPAC data indicates that only 49% of our LTELs made progress toward English proficiency, which is a decrease of 7.4% compared to the prior year. Consequently, while the foundational ELD instruction is in place, the specific strategies utilized for LTELs were only Somewhat Effective and will require recalibration.

Non-Contributing Actions

Action 2.9 - Teacher Induction Program: Effectiveness: Effective. This action provides extra training and mentorship for new teachers. The program was effective in ensuring new educators demonstrated mastery of teaching standards, directly contributing to the district's overall capacity to deliver high-quality tier-one instruction to all students.

Overall Analysis Statement: While KECSD observed notable successes with English Learner CAASPP growth and overall district attendance rates (which improved by 0.7%), the widening CAASPP achievement gap for Low-Income students and the dip in LTEL ELPAC progress must be addressed. The data suggests that while our structural supports (MTSS, coaches, paraprofessionals) are in place, the specific pedagogical strategies and interventions delivered through these actions need to be refined to be fully effective for all unduplicated student groups.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

Action 2.1 (Preservice Days for Classified and Certificated Staff): The action description was updated to reference the current 2025 CA School Dashboard data, ensuring the narrative accurately reflects the most recent performance data for our unduplicated student groups.

Action 2.2 (Academic Coaches and Training for Staff): The narrative structure of this action was reorganized. We separated and sequenced the description to begin with the 5 CCR (Increased or Improved Services) narrative, followed by the specific LREBG narrative requirements (state action, funding, need, allowability, and metrics). Additionally, Dashboard references were updated to current 2025 data, and LREBG funding amounts were reconciled for accuracy.

Action 2.3 (Professional Development): Based on reflections on our professional learning strategies, specific references to "LETRS" training were removed from this action. Furthermore, the description was expanded to elaborate on the specific design of our Professional Development, including clear details on when and how the training is delivered to staff. Dashboard references were also updated to 2025 data.

Action 2.4 (Interpreters EL): The narrative was updated to reference the current CA School Dashboard and align with the reality of our 2025 data, specifically noting the recent decrease in ELPI scores to accurately identify the root cause and need for this service.

Action 2.5 (Designated and Integrated ELD Instruction...): The description was updated to identify a clear need based on a current performance gap, noting that LTELs are at 59.4% and making progress. We also elaborated extensively on the design and delivery of our Professional Development regarding the ELA/ELD Framework, PLC meeting structures, and SIOP training (including when and how these PDs are offered).

Action 2.6 (Summer Programs): Similar to Action 2.2, the narrative was reorganized to present the 5 CCR justification before the LREBG requirements. The data statements regarding ELPI, Low-Income (LI), and English Learner (EL) performance were updated to match the 2025 Dashboard. We also updated the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS) paragraph with current 2025 CAST data and explicitly added Metric 3.1 (CAST) as a tool to measure the effectiveness of this action.

Action 2.7 (Paraprofessionals): The narrative was updated to reference the current CA School Dashboard to ensure alignment with 2025 data.

Action 2.8 (Intervention, Enrichment Programs, and Teacher Training): The description was restructured to cleanly separate the 5 CCR and LREBG narrative requirements. We updated all Dashboard references to the current year and verified that the LREBG funding amounts cited in the narrative are accurate and consistent.

Metric 2.1 (ELPI): To better monitor the specific language acquisition progress of our differing English Learner populations and reflect recent statutory changes, this metric has been updated to report English Learner (EL) and Long-Term English Learner (LTEL) data separately.

The actions outlined in Goal Three supported the progress toward the district's broad goal of providing access to a broad and challenging curriculum focused on 21st-century learning. The district focused on ensuring students acquired college and career readiness skills and developed a passion for continuous learning through expanded technology access and after-school programs. Overall, the district successfully carried out this goal with no substantive differences in the actual implementation of the planned action.

Action 3.1 - Technology/21st Century Learning:

Implementation Status: 5 - Full Implementation and Sustainability. Implementation: The district successfully implemented and maintained its 1:1 Chromebook initiative, ensuring that every student was provided with a dedicated personal device to access digital tools, core curriculum, and supplemental learning software. Furthermore, 21st-century learning skills were deeply integrated not only during the regular instructional day but also throughout our after-school and summer enrichment programs. There were no substantive differences in the planned action compared to the actual implementation. Successes: A major success was the seamless integration of these 1:1 devices to deliver targeted, personalized learning programs (such as differentiated math and ELA software) that specifically supported our Low-Income and English Learner students. Students successfully utilized this technology daily to foster critical thinking, communication, collaboration, and creativity. Challenges: Sustaining a 1:1 device fleet across the entire district presents ongoing logistical challenges, including managing the continuous repair and replacement lifecycle of broken or aging Chromebooks, as well as ensuring consistent internet connectivity at home for our most vulnerable student populations to complete digital assignments.

The District spent more than what was originally projected. The District purchased over 250 additional chromebooks as well as classroom TV displays to enhance the learning environment. More learning programs were purchased this year to increase student achievement.

KECSD observed progress towards closing the achievement gap as indicated on our CAASPP data (Points above the standard).

1. EL students increased 13.7 points in ELA, but decreased 26 points in Math. We are working with the county office to support this student population, and we expect to see an increase in CAASPP scores in coming years.

2. ELA - LI students increased 7 points from year 1 to year 2, and are 3.6 points above the baseline.

3. Math - LI students increased 4.3 points from year 1 to year 2, and are 0.6 points above the baseline.

KECSD has observed progress in recent years towards closing the achievement gap as indicated on our ELPAC data (49% Making Progress).

1. 59.4% of our LTELs made progress, which is a decrease of 5.5% over the prior year.

KECSD observed progress towards closing the achievement gap as indicated on our chronic absenteeism rates. KECSD increased their percentage of students attending school by 0.7% over the prior year, and also improved attendance rates in the following subgroups listed below.

Contributing Actions - Action 3.1 - Technology/21st Century Learning: Effectiveness: Effective. This action is principally directed to meet the needs of our Low-Income students by bridging the digital divide and providing 1:1 hardware and software resources to accelerate learning recovery. When evaluating effectiveness through our California Science Test (CAST) data (Metric 3.1), this action has proven highly successful for our targeted groups. Overall district CAST scores improved by 1.8%, and our Low-Income student scores increased by 2.84% year-over-year. Additionally, our Students with Disabilities (SWD) subgroup scores increased by 1.47% year-over-year. The continuous availability of 1:1 Chromebooks and interactive classroom TV displays directly facilitated the multimodal, hands-on science learning necessary to drive these positive outcomes.

Analysis Statement: Due to the comprehensive implementation of our 1:1 Chromebook fleet and personalized digital learning programs, KECSD successfully observed significant progress in closing achievement gaps on the state science assessment. While our English Learner (EL) subgroup dropped to 0% standard met on the 2025 CAST, our Low-Income and SWD student populations demonstrated meaningful, measurable growth. This indicates that our current technology infrastructure is highly effective at increasing academic proficiency for our socioeconomically disadvantaged pupils, though we must continue to integrate specific language scaffolds within our technology tools to better support our multilingual learners.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

Based on an analysis of current data, reflections on prior practice, and specific feedback from our educational partners, KECSD has made the following refinement to the action within Goal 3 to ensure alignment with our current 2025 California School Dashboard data:

Action 3.1 (Technology/21st Century Learning): The narrative description for this action was updated to explicitly reference the current 2025 CA School Dashboard data, ensuring the baseline need and student performance context are accurately represented. Furthermore, Metric 3.1 (California Science Test - CAST) was added to the monitoring plan to serve as a primary, measurable tool to gauge how effectively the integration of 1:1 technology and digital learning platforms is driving science proficiency and academic recovery for our unduplicated student groups.

The LEA used the following rating scale to determine the LEA's progress in implementing the actions to achieve the articulated goal. Ratings were based on an analysis of both inputs from educational partners and metrics.

Rating Scale (lowest to highest): 1 – Exploration and Research Phase; 2 – Beginning Development; 3 – Initial Implementation; 4 – Full Implementation; 5 – Full Implementation and Sustainability.

The actions executed under Goal Four were strategically implemented to support the progress toward our broad goal of cultivating a safe, welcoming, and positive school climate that fosters emotional well-being, high attendance, and robust family partnership. Throughout the 2025-26 school year, the district focused heavily on strengthening multi-tiered support systems, expanding mental and physical health access, and actively removing systemic barriers to student engagement. While the core objectives of these actions were successfully realized to support our unduplicated student populations, staffing constraints and localized programmatic shifts required tactical operational adjustments.

The actions outlined in Goal Four supported the progress toward meeting the goal of providing a positive, safe and welcoming school and district climate.

Actions Rated 5: Full Implementation and Sustainability

Action 4.1 - Mental Health and School Culture and Climate:

Implementation: The district deployed dedicated counseling and mental health services to provide targeted therapeutic interventions, crisis response, and proactive school-wide culture initiatives.

Successes: A major success was the establishment of structured, small-group counseling sessions that directly served our most vulnerable Low-Income and Foster Youth students. Local climate surveys reflected an increased sense of safety and emotional support on campus, validating our focus on trauma-informed practices.

Challenges: The soaring demand for intensive, individualized mental health caseloads occasionally stretched our counseling staff's capacity, making it challenging to balance required crisis interventions with proactive, campus-wide culture-building activities.

Action 4.2 - MTSS and RTI:

Implementation: The district systematically utilized Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS) and Response to Intervention (RTI) protocols to provide data-driven academic and behavioral interventions during designated school-day blocks.

Successes: Grade-level collaboration teams successfully used universal screening data to place Low-Income and English Learner students into fluid, targeted instruction tiers, which prevented learning gaps from widening further in core subject areas.

Challenges: Coordinating the scheduling mechanics of the RTI blocks across multiple grade levels without encroaching upon core instructional or elective time proved logistically complex for site administrators.

Action 4.3 - Learning Directors:

Implementation: Learning Directors were utilized at the school sites to oversee curriculum implementation, manage student data tracking, coordinate student study teams (SSTs), and support teachers with instructional coaching.

Successes: Learning Directors were highly effective at keeping focus on our unduplicated subgroups, ensuring that teachers translated diagnostic data into immediate classroom accommodations and language scaffolds for English Learners.

Challenges: Learning Directors had to dedicate an unexpected amount of operational time to managing complex state compliance and assessment coordination, which temporarily reduced their availability for direct classroom coaching.

Action 4.4 - Attendance:

Implementation: The district executed an aggressive attendance monitoring and intervention program, leveraging automated notification systems, localized incentives, and direct home visits to combat chronic absenteeism.

Successes: Our targeted outreach successfully reduced chronic absenteeism among our low-income student group, driven by district liaisons.

Challenges: Overcoming deep-seated, systemic barriers to attendance, such as family transportation deficits or acute health issues within families, remained a persistent obstacle that required intensive, time-consuming case management.

Action 4.5 - Health Aides and (District Nurse-80.15% S&C):

Implementation: The district maintained health aides across sites and funded 80.15% of the District Nurse's position through Supplemental and Concentration funds to manage student medical needs, conduct screenings, and coordinate care.

Successes: The health team provided an essential safety net for our Low-Income students, who frequently lack consistent access to primary healthcare. By managing chronic conditions and acute illnesses directly on campus, they maximized the time students spent safely in their classrooms.

Challenges: Managing high daily volume in the health offices during peak seasonal illness windows occasionally, required the nursing team to carefully triage operational priorities.

Action 4.6 - Parent Involvement:

Implementation: The district actively implemented family engagement strategies and hosted regular, interactive parent advisory meetings, including School Site Council (SSC), English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC), and the District English Learner Advisory Committee (DELAC).

Successes: We achieved a substantial increase in parent attendance at site-level district meetings. Providing primary-language translation and welcoming environments empowered English Learner and Low-Income families to become active partners in their children's language acquisition and academic goals.

Challenges: Conflicting work shifts and childcare constraints faced by many of our working families made consistent, high-volume participation at evening events difficult to sustain, requiring sites to offer flexible alternative meeting structures.

Action 4.2, MTSS and RTI, the District spent more than projected as needs for our students changed, we needed to pivot and provide additional resources. Action 4.4, Attendance, the District lost liaison positions and did not fill them; thus, the amount budgeted was affected.

Action 4.6, Parent Involvement, the District partnered with Fresno State and Success Together to provide more opportunities for families. The contracts for these programs were not as much as what was anticipated, and so we did not fully expend the amount projected.

Contributing Actions

Action 4.2 - MTSS and RTI: Effectiveness: Effective. This action was strategically designed to deploy data-driven interventions for our most vulnerable subgroups. By systematically utilizing universal screening data, grade-level teams successfully placed Low-Income and English Learner students into fluid, targeted instructional tiers. This agile MTSS framework was highly effective in preventing learning gaps from widening in core subject areas, ensuring our unduplicated students received immediate, differentiated support.

Action 4.3 - Learning Directors: Effectiveness: Effective. Learning Directors serve a critical role in overseeing curriculum implementation and coordinating Student Study Teams (SSTs) specifically tailored to support our unduplicated subgroups. This action was highly effective; Learning Directors successfully guided teachers in translating diagnostic data into immediate classroom accommodations and language scaffolds, which directly supported the academic access and language acquisition of our English Learners and Foster Youth.

Action 4.5 - Health Aides and (District Nurse-80.15% S&C): Effectiveness: Effective. This action provides an essential safety net for our Low-Income students, who frequently lack consistent access to primary healthcare in the home environment. By actively managing chronic conditions, administering necessary screenings, and treating acute illnesses directly on campus, the nursing staff was highly effective in mitigating health-related absences. Triage at the school site successfully maximized the direct instructional seat time for our socioeconomically disadvantaged pupils.

Action 4.6 - Parent Involvement: Effectiveness: Somewhat Effective. This action aims to build strong home-to-school partnerships, particularly for our English Learner and Low-Income families. While the district experienced a highly successful, measurable increase in Title I meeting attendance this year due to targeted outreach and translation services, feedback from our educational partners indicates that rigid meeting schedules still prevent a significant portion of our working families from participating. The action is Somewhat Effective because, while the families we do reach receive excellent primary-language support, the district has not yet achieved the broad, systemic participation rates desired across all unduplicated demographics.

Non-Contributing Actions

Action 4.1 - Mental Health and School Culture and Climate: Effectiveness: Effective. Designed to support the broad student body, this action deployed dedicated counseling and mental health services across the district. Based on our local climate survey data, which reflected an overall increased sense of safety, connectedness, and emotional support on campus, this action was highly effective. The proactive, trauma-informed practices successfully improved the baseline emotional well-being of the general student population.

Action 4.4 - Attendance: Effectiveness: Somewhat Effective. This district-wide action targets our overall chronic absenteeism rates through automated monitoring and attendance interventions. While targeted outreach efforts successfully yielded localized attendance improvements, widespread, systemic attendance barriers (such as ongoing family transportation deficits and acute health issues) persist across the district. Because our overarching chronic absenteeism rates have not yet fully rebounded to pre-pandemic baseline targets, the strategies within this action are currently rated as Somewhat Effective and require continued structural refinement.

Overall Analysis Statement: KECSD has made significant, measurable progress in cultivating a safe, supportive, and academically responsive school climate. The foundational MTSS structures (Action 4.2), the instructional leadership of Learning Directors (Action 4.3), and our campus-based physical and mental health teams (Actions 4.1 & 4.5) have proven highly effective in stabilizing the learning environment and directly supporting the holistic well-being of all students, particularly our English Learners, Foster Youth, and Low-Income populations. However, the data surrounding chronic absenteeism and parent engagement reveals that while our localized, traditional interventions yield some success, deep-seated socioeconomic barriers continue to restrict full engagement. Moving forward, the district must pivot from Somewhat Effective traditional models to highly flexible, barrier-free engagement and attendance strategies to fully realize the objectives of Goal 4.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

Based on an ongoing analysis of local data, educational partner feedback, and a comprehensive reflection on the effectiveness of our 2025-26 implementation, KECSD has determined that the broad intent of Goal 4, its associated metrics, and our long-term target outcomes remain highly relevant to our students' needs. Therefore, the overarching goal and its metrics will remain unchanged for the coming year.

However, reflecting on the localized challenges and the "Somewhat Effective" ratings identified during our annual review, the district is making the following strategic refinements to the implementation of specific actions to better serve our educational community:

Action 4.4 - Attendance [Non-Contributing] (Refinement of Practice): Reflection: While traditional, compliance-driven outreach (such as automated calls and standard attendance contracts) localized some improvements, our reflection on practice revealed that these methods do not adequately resolve the deep-seated socioeconomic and physiological root causes of chronic absenteeism.

Change for the Coming Year: The district is pivoting its attendance strategy from a reactive, compliance-based model to a proactive, wraparound support model. Moving forward, the implementation of this action will focus heavily on intensive case management that actively addresses systemic barriers. This includes working with families to establish alternative transportation solutions and utilizing our nursing staff earlier in the absence cycle to address localized health barriers before they result in chronic truancy.

Action 4.6 - Parent Involvement [Contributing] (Refinement of Practice): Reflection: Relying solely on traditional, fixed-schedule evening meetings inadvertently created an access barrier for our working-class, Low-Income, and English Learner families due to conflicting shift work and childcare constraints.

Change for the Coming Year: To achieve systemic, broad-based family engagement for our various student groups, school sites will continue to look for unique ways to bring more parents to meetings like we did for Title I Night, which was a great success.

		The 2023 California School Dashboard indicated that our district's Suspension Rate fell into the Orange performance tier, with 3.5% of students suspended at least one day. To directly address this dashboard indicator and improve our overarching school climate, maintaining a safe, supportive, and emotionally healthy campus environment is a top priority for KECSD. To ensure all students have access to the socio-emotional support necessary to thrive academically and behaviorally, the district will provide comprehensive mental health services and proactive school culture initiatives. Our current Dashboard is encouraging as our suspension category is in the Green performance tier, with only 3% being suspended, so we are on the right track with decreasing our suspension rates. Because student well-being is foundational to academic success and reducing suspension rates, this action provides dedicated counseling personnel and mental health resources to support the broad student body. Our comprehensive approach to mental health and school climate includes: As part of a comprehensive needs assessment, KECSD looked into LEA-level Red indicators and found a common need among English Learners, Foster Youth, and Students with Disabilities student groups in the area of suspension. A common need of these subgroups is additional social-emotional support. To meet the needs of English Learners, Foster Youth, and Students with Disabilities and reduce suspension rates, KECSD will implement MTSS/RTI at all sites, providing all students, including English Learners, Foster Youth, and Students with Disabilities with social-emotional learning and mental health support. This will be accomplished through counselors and behavioral support systems that address all students and through the SST process that identifies the needs of the whole child and connects the students with interventions for any academic, behavioral, social-emotional, or mental health needs. To address the Red for Students with Disabilities in Suspension, Lincoln will provide the following: A. Develop Individualized Behavior Plans: Work with the IEP team to develop BPs that address the specific behavioral challenges of each student. These plans should outline strategies for preventing and managing challenging behaviors in the classroom.

On the 2023 Dashboard, all Students, English Learners, Hispanic, Low-Income, and Students with Disabilities at Rafer Johnson Junior High were red for suspension. A needs assessment revealed a common need among these student groups for increased mentorship. To address this need, Rafer Johnson will establish a mentorship program where students are paired with supportive staff or community members who can provide guidance and support, fostering a sense of belonging and reducing the likelihood of behavioral issues leading to suspensions.

4.2	MTSS and RTI	The current CA Dashboard indicates that our Low-Income and English Learners perform lower on state ELA and Math assessments in Distance from Standard as compared to our All-Student group. Also, 59.4% of our LTELs are making progress on the ELPI. Based on a local needs assessment and a root cause analysis Kingsburg has found that our English learners and low income students encounter significant challenges accessing learning due to a variety of environmental factors impacting their decision-making, behavior, social-emotional and mental health. Also, more collaboration between the special education department and general education was brought up as a need. To address this need the district will provide additional support in the way of a BCBA, as our EL and LI students need early intervention with learning behavior needs to provide support before the achievement gap widens. The SELPA was consulted through our Director of Pupil Services who also serves as the Director of Special Education. Through this consultation, the need for more collaboration between the special education department and general education teachers was also identified, along with additional resources to support students with disabilities above and beyond in mainstream contexts. More consistent collaboration between special education teachers and general education teachers will take place, so that general education teachers have specific strategies to support their special education students. A district Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS) is a comprehensive framework designed to address the academic, behavioral, and social-emotional needs of all students through a tiered approach. The design elements of a district MTSS system typically include the following components: 1 Tiered Levels of Support: -Tier 1 - Universal Support: This level includes high-quality, evidence-based instruction and interventions provided to all students within the general education setting. It focuses on preventing academic and behavioral difficulties through effective core instruction and positive behavior supports. -Tier 2 - Targeted Support: Students who require additional support beyond Tier 1 receive targeted interventions and supports. 		The implementation of PBIS is designed to decrease suspensions for all students and keep students in school. PBIS is an evidence-based three-tiered framework for improving and integrating all of the data, systems, and practices affecting student outcomes every day. The attributes of PBIS include the following: Tailored Interventions: Use data to develop targeted interventions that address the specific behavioral challenges faced by LI, FY, and EL students. The district's home/foster youth community liaisons will work with SARB and the school community to educate families on the importance of being in school. This team, now known as "The Home Team" also includes a behavioral interventionist, attendance specialist, counselors, and a local resource center. Together, the "Home Team" works to address the needs of families, making it easier for their students to attend school. Services include helping families with meal delivery, technology, academics, transportation, and home visits. With the support of SARB and The Home Team, according to the current California Dashboard, the LI subgroup was in the "Blue" level, and the EL subgroup was in the "Blue" level, as per the current CA School Dashboard. Foster Youth had no performance color due to fewer than 11 students. 		Our experience and the outcome of conducting a needs assessment indicate that students with chronic absences due to medical appointments, health issues, or other concerns could benefit from additional school based health services because not attending school has a direct impact on their learning. Students that have a higher rate of sick day absences due to physical or emotional issues will have these needs met by the district providing additional health aide and a district nurse. We expect that additional health support to provide the individual medical care by health aides and a district nurse to help these students stay healthy, which in return will have them in class on a more consistent basis, therefore helping to expedite the closing of achievement gaps, and improve attendance rates. The district will provide health aides at each site, and additional district nurse time to enhance the overall well being of our students, which in turn will increase the attendance rates for our students. The School Nurse will have additional time to supervise additional health aides. By increasing the number of health aides, the school nurse would have more time to identify students with chronic health conditions that are missing school. The school nurse will help case manage those students, thus improving chronic absentee rates in the district. The main design elements of this service include the following: 1. Individual Health Plans: Develop individualized health plans in collaboration with families and educators for FY and LI students. Our experience and the outcome of conducting a root cause analysis indicate that these students would benefit from having parents that are trained in how to support their children at home with their academics. Our needs assessment identified a need for additional opportunities for parents to engage and participate in their children's school activities. In our experience, LI parents in the district have multiple jobs and work all hours of the day. EL parents have the same challenges and also have the language barriers to deal with. In our experience, parents that are actively involved in the school are associated with student improvement in a variety of areas including academic performance, attitudes and behavior, attendance, student engagement, and graduation rates. As a result of the District English Language Advisory Committee (DELAC) and other district meetings, a request for parent workshops focusing on ESL and technology was voiced. Parents want to understand how students are using technology in the classroom so they can support their students at home. The district will provide a variety of parent workshop opportunities to meet the needs of our school population and encourage parents to become partners with the district in their child's education, resulting in increased communication, engagement, and higher levels of student achievement. 1. Priority 5: Pupil Engagement (Engagement)

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

KECSD conducted a needs assessment including educational partner engagement with the staff at Island Community Day School and a parent and family survey. Through the educational partner feedback specific to Island Community Day School, KECSD realizes how important it is to reach our students that have had disciplinary and academic challenges in the past. In an effort to help these students become the best version of themselves, our district recognizes the need for consistent school attendance and to feel as though they are part of a warm and welcoming school community in order for them to succeed. Students must feel safe, valued, and have a sense of belonging. Supportive, responsive environments have tremendous benefits, including strengthening student engagement, increasing daily attendance, increase in academic success and building positive relationships. Since our students at this site have a 87.31% average daily attendance rate, our district has decided to continue to concentrate on this area after consulting with the school's educational partners. It is believed that this will also help improve the suspension rate at the site. Currently, these severe behavioral challenges are reflected in a disproportionately high suspension rate, with 50% of the site's students having been suspended for at least one day. This goal is focused on Island Community Day School. Due to the size of the student population at Island Community Day School, subgroup data is not reportable. Therefore this goal will focus on decreased absenteeism for all students.

Goal Analysis [2025-26]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

During the 2025-26 school year, the implementation of Goal Five was singularly focused on deploying specialized Equity Multiplier funds to support the unique, at-risk student population at Island Community Day School. Because this site serves students with severe past disciplinary and attendance barriers, highlighted by a baseline reality where 50% of the students had been suspended at least one day, the district executed a single, highly integrated action designed to completely revitalize the campus environment. The core implementation strategy relied on using physical activity and structured play as a gateway to improve mental health, academic focus, and overall daily attendance as measured by our P2 data.

Implementation: The district successfully procured and installed updated, engaging Physical Education (PE) facilities and specialized equipment at the Island Community Day School campus. Site administration and staff purposefully integrated these new physical activities into the daily master schedule. Drawing on CDC and NIH research, these PE blocks were utilized not merely as recreation, but as structured, therapeutic interventions to teach emotional regulation, improve cognitive focus, and provide a healthy outlet for students to process trauma and excess energy.

Successes: The addition of the new PE facilities served as a massive, tangible motivator for our students, directly contributing to stabilized daily attendance rates (as monitored via local P2 reporting). Furthermore, providing students with a structured, highly active physical outlet successfully reduced in-class restlessness and localized behavioral disruptions. Staff utilized the PE environment to proactively model sportsmanship and restorative conflict resolution, which successfully prevented several minor peer disputes from escalating into suspendable offenses.

Challenges: Implementing a robust, highly active PE program for a student population prone to severe behavioral dysregulation presented immediate operational challenges. In the fall semester, competitive physical activities frequently triggered peer-to-peer conflicts. To maintain a safe climate and ensure the new equipment was used effectively, the site had to deploy an "all-hands-on-deck" approach. Administrators

and mental health support staff had to actively push into the PE blocks to maintain extremely low adult-to-student ratios, allowing them to immediately mediate disputes and teach necessary self-regulation skills in real-time.

The LEA used the following rating scale to determine the LEA's progress in implementing the actions to achieve the articulated goal. Ratings were based on an analysis of both inputs from educational partners and metrics.

Rating Scale (lowest to highest): 1 – Exploration and Research Phase; 2 – Beginning Development; 3 – Initial Implementation; 4 – Full Implementation; 5 – Full Implementation and Sustainability.

The actions outlined in Goal Five supported the progress toward meeting the goal of providing a positive, safe and welcoming school climate for the students at Island Community Day School as measured by an increase in daily attendance by 3% for all students.

Students will be able to attend school on a consistent basis due to the safe and welcoming environment provided at Island Community Day School.

Action 5.1 - Mental Health, School Culture, Academics, Climate & Physical Education:

Implementation Status: 5 - Full Implementation and Sustainability.

KECSD has committed to providing a more welcoming environment at Island, combined with outdoor areas which will provide for more ways to conduct physical fitness for their EL, LI, and FY students. There were no substantive differences in the planned action compared to the actual implementation.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

The District spent more than what was projected in order to increase the attendance rates for students attending Island Community Day School. More appealing equipment was purchased and a new sports area was poured to increase the physical activity which ties directly to mental health.

The actions outlined in Goal Five helped make progress towards the LEA's goal: By 2027, KECSD will provide a positive, safe, and welcoming school climate for the students at Island Community Day School as measured by an increase of 5% in our local attendance data (P2 report) for all students, alongside providing comprehensive mental health, physical education, and academic recovery supports.

KECSD maintained progress towards maintaining our attendance rates as indicated on our P2 Local Attendance Rates.

1. 87.31% Average Daily Attendance

KECSD acknowledges that sustainable change in attendance rates will take multiple years, particularly given the intensive needs of the students served. With continued implementation and refinement of supports, we anticipate that the daily attendance rate will begin to increase over time as student trust, connectedness, and consistency improve. Despite the local attendance rate remaining at 87%, we

consider this action somewhat effective based on a comprehensive review of both educational partner input and the contextual challenges facing this student population. The student population at Island Community Day School represents a uniquely high-needs group, including students with histories of truancy, disciplinary placement, and social-emotional challenges. Maintaining the rate at 87%, rather than seeing an decrease, is itself a sign of stabilization and progress in an environment where absenteeism has historically been difficult to address.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

Based on an ongoing analysis of our local P2 attendance data, behavioral metrics, and a comprehensive reflection on the first-year implementation of our Equity Multiplier initiatives, KECSD has determined that the broad intent of Goal 5 and its target outcomes remain absolutely critical to the rehabilitation of the students at Island Community Day School. Therefore, the overarching goal and its established metrics, specifically targeting a 3% increase in local P2 attendance data and a significant reduction in the baseline 50% suspension rate, will remain unchanged for the coming year.

However, reflecting on the localized implementation challenges and the "Somewhat Effective" rating identified during our annual review, the district is making the following strategic and operational refinements to Action 5.1 (Mental Health, School Culture, Academics, Climate & Physical Education) to ensure maximum impact in the upcoming school year: Action 5.1 - Instructional Refinement (Structured Cooperative Play):

Reflection: While the introduction of new physical activities successfully motivated students to attend school, our reflection on practice revealed that unstructured or highly competitive physical activities frequently triggered severe peer-to-peer conflicts among this dysregulated student population, requiring intense, reactive adult mediation to prevent suspendable offenses.

Change for the Coming Year: To directly combat the site's high suspension rate, the instructional delivery of the PE blocks will be fundamentally restructured. Site staff and mental health personnel will utilize the new equipment to facilitate highly structured, cooperative physical activities. These blocks will actively embed socio-emotional learning (SEL) and restorative justice practices directly into the gameplay. By explicitly teaching emotional regulation, teamwork, and peer-to-peer conflict resolution through guided physical activity, the district aims to proactively neutralize behavioral triggers before they escalate, thereby maximizing instructional seat time and sustaining the positive upward trend in our P2 attendance data.

Since the students attending Island Community Day School have had severe past disciplinary, attendance, and/or academic issues, our district recognizes the absolute importance of consistent daily attendance. These students must be present to receive the intensive instruction and systemic restorative support they require to complete their program and successfully return to their home school. Input from educational partners through our local needs assessment indicates that motivation to attend school consistently, and engage positively with peers, can be significantly increased by providing a more dynamic, physically engaging learning and social environment. To directly address these behavioral and attendance barriers, KECSD will utilize Equity Multiplier funding to develop updated Physical Education (PE) facilities and procure specialized equipment at Island Community Day School. Completed Enhancements: We poured the basketball/pickleball area, purchased the basketball hoop, pickleball equipment, striped the area, purchased other PE equipment, purchased storage chests for the equipment, t-shirts, sweaters, increased the playing area with fencing, and purchased a windscreen. Planned Enhancements (2026-27 and beyond): Moving forward, the district will continue to build on this progress to maximize student engagement. Planned physical environment upgrades include: raised garden beds, and outdoor workout equipment. We will also procure additional PE equipment, such as volleyball, soccer, bowling sets, etc. To further foster a strong school culture, academic engagement, and mental health, future funding will support the addition of mental health calming corner supplies, sensory lighting, modular furniture, interactive touchscreen TVs, and school-branded clothing and signs to increase students' sense of belonging. Additionally, we plan to integrate hands-on learning tools like a 3D printer. This action is rooted in evidence-based research: Attendance and Behavior (CDC): According to the CDC (cdc.gov), students who are physically active tend to have better school attendance,

		as well as better grades, cognitive performance (e.g., memory), and classroom behaviors (e.g., on-task behavior). Academic Achievement (NIH): According to the National Institutes of Health (NIH), students who engage in physically active lessons, on average, improved their academic achievement by 6 percent. By adding these specialized PE facilities and equipment, KECSD will foster greater motivation to attend school, increase physical activity while students are on campus, and provide a structured, healthy outlet for emotional regulation. We expect this intervention will directly aid in decreasing the behavioral incidents that lead to our 50% suspension rate, while simultaneously driving a measurable 3% increase in daily attendance as tracked by our local P2 reporting.
